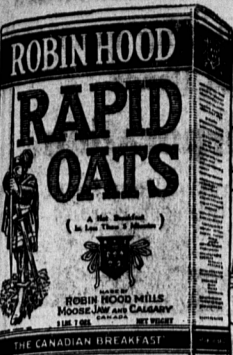

ABBIES DEFEAT CRYSTALS 5-2 IN HARD FOUGHT GAME

Although Ice Was Not as Fast as Usual Fans Were Given a Good Exhibition of Speedy and Keenly Contested Hockey—Next Game in Charlottetown Friday Night.

SUMMERSIDE, Jan. 19.—There was a capacity house including over two hundred from Charlottetown at the Crystal Rink, Summerside last night for the third game of the P. E. Island Hockey League which proved to be one of the most interesting ever played here. In the first period the game was held in a hard pack. The Abbies led by goals were injured Diamond receiving a nasty gash on the forehead and Lefurgey a cut under the right eye which required several stitches. On account of the soft weather the ice was not as hard as usual but the brand of hockey handed out would certainly make one desire to see it on fast ice.

The game was won by the Abbies by the score of 5 to 2. The Abbies were greatly strengthened by the addition of Kelly on the defence. He and Diamond were certainly a hard pair to get by.

Williams played a splendid game making some dazzling runs and at other times shooting effectively from outside the defence. Jack Gordon as usual played his star game, but perhaps the remarkable feature of the Abbie forward line was the wonderful play of Lou Campbell who seemed to be in the right spot at the right time. He gave the superior exhibitions of stickhandling. Cox played better than ever and if he continues to show up as he did last night he will be one of the best of the Island forwards. Although only used as a sub last night his playing merited for him a place on the regular lineup.

MacEachern also showed up well last night and Cronin gave a good account of himself while on the ice.

For the Crystals Lefurgey in goal although hampered by his accident which interfered with his usual unerring vision put up a splendid exhibition of goal minding. While Rogers was on he played a star game but he could not be used throughout on account of a sprained wrist. MacQuarrie who was without any practice played as a substitute and did good work. Morris made some excellent rushes and Gauthier presented an exhibition of back skating and forward skating as well that would be hard to beat. Silliphant played a wonderful game and Hackett for a young player did sensational work at times. Montgomery and Gallant also gave splendid assistance to their team.

The Crystals reverted to their back skating game of last year while the Abbies started in conventional. It was a long time since two teams so evenly matched from these old time rivals faced one another. The game was anybody's up to the very last but while neither team had the better of the territory it being evenly divided the Abbies were the best team last night and deserved every goal they got.

Jim Herrell and Arthur Allen called the teams together at 8.25.

First Period—The puck went back to Williams and he went down and shot from outside defence the shot being deflected. Silliphant and Kelly both made beautiful end to end rush. Whackey tries Lefurgey on a long shot and is unsuccessful. The pace quickened, Williams went down, was driven into the corner. Silliphant came back and he was followed up by Hackett. They try Diamond who tells and there was a general mixup but no score was made. Morris tries Diamond for a nice stop then Williams Rogers and Lou Campbell contribute to the real fast hockey being played at this stage. Fred Kofy se-

where Lefurgey was called upon to make some good stops. With five minutes of the period and game left to play Kelly and Gordon combined in a beautiful rush and scored number three for the Abbies. Then MacQuarrie went up with all the forwards in an endeavor to gain tie the score. After the Crystals had made a rush with all their men at the Abbie end Williams broke through with one of his lightning flashes and with only Rogers assisting Lefurgey scored the fourth goal for the Abbies. The fast pace continued with the Abbies forcing and one minute later the Abbies scored the fifth and final goal of the game. The Crystals came right back and peppered Diamond three successive shots but Dutchie although looking like a war scarred veteran was effective despite his injuries and turned everything aside. Williams and MacEachern combined for a nice run but Lefurgey was there and made a beautiful stop. Thus one of the hardest fought closest and most interesting games ever played here ended 5-2 in favor of the Abbies. The game was comparatively clean although three penalties were handed out.

Next Game—A special train will leave Summerside for the next game in Charlottetown provided a sufficient number signify their intention of going down. This was noticeable in the increased number of strangers that could be seen in our streets today, and this fact had an added value when it was found

Mr. J. J. MacKinnon, first financial chairman of the Association spoke of the favorable progress that had been made since the inception of the organization, and of the support it was receiving from both city and province. He thought that one of the greatest incentives to be an indirect benefit to every resident of the Province. The wealth of the world had increased in great extent in the last few years, and as a consequence more money was being spent, as a rule much of it was spent in tourist resorts, and this country had every asset to become in time one of the greatest tourist places in the world.

Mr. J. H. Myers, Commissioner of Agriculture, warmly approved of the compliments paid by Premier Stewart to the efficiency of the officers of the Association and the work so far accomplished.

He believed it to be an excellent business proposition. As an instance of the hitherto unnoticed opportunities we possess in this Province, he referred to the installation in the old flour mill plant in Charlottetown of a machine for cleaning natural grass seed, for good grades of which there is a great demand for golf courses, lawns, etc. The men at the plant have now over two months' work ahead in cleaning the seed that has been brought in, grading it into No. 1 and No. 2, the first grade being worth \$1.00 a pound and the second 80 cents. Hitherto this seed has been looked upon merely as a nuisance.

Hon. Mr. Myers cited also the benefits which the Province will derive from the disease free cattle area, and the opportunities in connection with poultry raising.

The old fashioned methods of farming have gone into the discard. The farmer who is alive to present day change with the changing times, is as well off as ever. In the past, in fact Mr. Myers believed there were more opportunities open to the business-like farmer in this Province today than ever before.

The President here called upon Mr. MacLeod, chairman of the financial committee, who explained the plans for carrying out the present campaign and proceeded with the organization of the ten teams who start out on the drive today, and who will submit reports of the drive in conclusion.

Mr. L. B. Miller, the next speaker said that ever since the Association was organized he had watched its progress with a great deal of interest. He paid a compliment to the President for the great amount of energy and ability that he had thrown into the work, and to the officers in general for the splendid support they had given, it was plainly a labor of love and was being served by good men. The movement was in its infancy but it started out with the sympathy of the people behind it.

In making plans for the attraction of tourists, said the speaker it was also well to see first that the house was in order for their reception, that the city and province was made as attractive as possible and inviting to visitors.

Every citizen should be asked to do his bit in this respect. Councilor Ruttray signified his pleasure at being able to be present, and went on to speak of the efficiency of the officers who had already accomplished so much good in regard to the tourist traffic. Everybody realized the importance and value of the work that was being done, and the fact that the Association was carrying on this work was composed of the men most fitted for it. Speaking from his experience in the past and from his impression of the attitude of the City Council toward the Association, he felt that he could say that body would treat any request from the organization to the best of their ability, and means. In conclusion he said that judging from the progress that had already been made in educating the people to the value of the Association, any indifference on the part of the public would soon be entirely dissipated.

Mr. C. H. Steves, after thanking the Association for giving him the opportunity to be present, spoke of the necessity of broadcasting advertising literature about the Province, and gave instances of the ignorance that is prevalent in regard to P. E. I. in the United States. He said, with the necessary publicity, people from all parts of the continent would flock to our native beaches in preference to those of other well known tourist resorts.
