On Saturday the Murray Harbor train was ten minutes late, the morning train from the east fifteen minutes late, the Cape Traverse train five minutes late, and the evening train from the east were each twenty minutes late. The western train was on time.

The death of Mrs. Wm. Lader, City, which occurred at her home on Hillside St., Sunday afternoon about two o'clock, removes one of the oldest citizens of Charlottetown. Mrs. Lader was in her ninety-third year and up to the time of her death was quite active and about the only sign of advanced years was a slight dimming of the eyesight while she retained all other faculties up to the last. On Friday she was out around as usual and enjoyed a walk around the city in company with her only daughter Miss Maria Moore. On Sunday she arose as usual and dressed and no warning of approaching death was apparent until about one thirty when she laid on a sofa and passed peacefully away. She was a native of Southport and before her marriage to a Mr. Moore, was a Miss Kelly of that place and one of her brothers was Hammond Kelly's father. On her first husband's death she married Mr. Lader who also predeceased her some years ago. She was a consistent member of the Methodist Church. Her funeral takes place this afternoon.

The deceased was one of the best known of citizens and was particularly well known among horsemen throughout the city and province as a horseman, having been identified with the horse buying and exporting and the lively stable business for many years. He leaves his mother, Mrs. George Essory, a widow and two brothers and a sister to mourn. These are Herman and Gordon in Massachusetts and Miss Mary in this city. To the bereaved The Guardian extends sympathy.

Christmas Day, 1910, has passed over and in the observance of it citizens pursued the usual mode and religiously and socially celebrated the day and the subsequent holiday in a manner akin to other years. With the festive day there came a light snow-fall which made driving on the streets just passable. Yesterday quite a number took advantage of this but the numbers were not up to past years. The religious observance of Christmas was equally as pronounced as in the past with the exception of attendance at the services which was not up to the usual numbers for the season owing to the rain fall in the morning and the sleet of the evening. Nearly all churches were appropriately decorated while in all special music was rendered. The beautiful carol service in The First Methodist Church deserves special mention as does also the Christmas music of the choir and the organist. In St. Paul's St. James', the Baptist, Grace and in fact, each of the others, there were special Christmas numbers in addition to the regular service and the clergy delivered sermons appropriate to the occasion. As usual much attention was paid to the poor and steps were taken by different churches and institutions which were effective in relieving want and brightening many homes in the Christmas season. It is regrettable that there was more evidence of drinking this Christmas than in Xmas 1909. This morning six drunks taken in charge Saturday evening, will appear, while last Xmas three for over indulgence in fiery liquid in the celebration of the day appeared after Xmas.

NORTH SEA HAS CLAIMED YOUNG GRACE

LONDON, Dec. 23—With the approach of midnight no tidings have yet been received from S. Grace, the intrepid young aviator who disappeared Thursday afternoon while essaying a return cross-channel flight from Calais to Dover, in an aeroplane and the belief that he generally prevails in London is that the cold north sea held somewhere on its turbulent breast, the story of a tragedy. Every nook and shore and inland where it was thought, perchance, young Grace might have landed were searched today but unavailingly, and the portions of the north sea on the lookout for the youth or wreckage of his machine likewise reported that their search had been in vain.

Grace carried with him petrol sufficient for a flight of about five hours. His biplane was not fitted with pontoons. He wore a cork jacket, but in case of a fall into the water, he would have been encumbered by his heavy fuel-lined top boots. The general belief is that it would be impossible for his machine to float for any great length of time, and that unless the aviator was rescued by a ship bound for some distant land there is slender hope that he escaped death in the sea.

NEWARK, Ohio, Dec. 22—Twenty years in the penitentiary was the sentence passed today upon Montella Watha, who was convicted of manslaughter on Dec. 17 on a charge of having taken part in the lynching of Carl Etherington, a "dry" detective last July. A motion for a new trial was overruled.

MAY BE A HITCH IN QUEBEC BRIDGE TENDER

OTTAWA, Dec. 22—It is understood that while recommendation in favor of the acceptance of the tender of the St. Lawrence Bridge Company for the construction of the Quebec bridge, has been received by the Government, the commission is not unanimous. Two are in favor of it and one dissents. The papers have been before the cabinet council, but no decision has been reached and none may be till after the holidays.

LOOKED LIKE SPECK IN THE HEAVENS

LOS ANGELES, December 23—Aviator Arch Hoxsey made an inspection from his Wright biplane of the inner and outer harbors of Los Angeles from a height of 3,300 feet. From this distance he appeared a mere speck in the sky to those below. Hoxsey reported afterwards that he was able to see ships and docks distinctly from that distance, and could have drawn acute war maps of the entire territory if his hands had been free. He was in the air twenty-eight minutes and made an average speed of more than forty miles an hour.

NEW PLAN FOR MISS ANGLIN

NEW YORK, Dec. 22—Margaret Anglin, entirely recovered from the throat trouble that necessitated the closing of her engagement in "The Awakening of Helena Ritchie" about a month ago, will make her first appearance under the direction of Liebler and Company on New Year's Day in a new comedy called "Green Stockings." The play is by A. E. W. Mason and George Fanning, and the title refers to the English custom that provides the elder sister of a bride with green stockings at the wedding.

REPAIRS COST \$145,000

WASHINGTON, December 23—After the Puritan has been placed in dock at Norfolk, it is estimated that it will cost the government \$145,000 to put her in sea-worthy condition. This is merely an estimate based upon what is believed to be the extent of the damage wrought by the two explosions of the gelatine and it is said that the ultimate cost may reach as high as \$250,000. It is not the intention to replace all the damaged plates, but merely to put the ship in such shape as will make it available for naval military uses. Because of the Puritan's antiquated design she is not regarded as

a fighting ship, but in time of war might be used as a sort of advance fortification in front of shore fortifications. For these reasons the navy department does not consider it a good business proposition to abandon her and believes that she can be applied to uses which will warrant the expenditure of the sum needed to save her.
