FOOTBALL

Football fans in the city will have a chance on Thursday to see the Mac-Mac Indian team in action. They will be brought to the city by Rev. John A. McDonald, of Grand River and expect to get into action with the Abbies and thus carry the Football championship home with them. This will hardly be possible though, as some of the Abbies best men will be in St. John, taking part in the indoor championships. It is hoped, however, that a game between the Indians and the S. D. C's, or Connaughts will take place. There is a great difference of opinion as to who will be the winners of the football match which takes place this afternoon at Victoria Park, between the Connaughts and St. Dunstan's. The College won the first game, while the second match resulted in a draw, neither side scoring. This afternoon in Victoria Park at 3.30 the two teams will line up on the gridiron for the third time and it can be depended upon that the game will be a keen one. If the Connaughts win they will even up matters with the Collegians and yet, another game will be necessary to decide the rubber.

SHOOTING

YORK CLUB'S PRIZE MEETING. The annual prize meet of the York Rifle Club took place on Saturday, at the York rifle range, and in spite of not altogether favorable weather conditions was a very successful affair. There were about forty competitors, and the shooting, in the principal match, was at the 200, 500 and 600 yards ranges, a prize being provided for every competitor; the scores, of course, deciding the order of award. Apart from this general competition, there was a special Ladies' Match, in which each competitor nominated the lady for whom he was shooting; ten prizes being provided for the ladies whose champions composed the first ten in the results of this competition, which was shot at the 200 yards range only. Mr. J. M. Crockett was the particular star of the meeting. He not only was top scorer in the general competition down the range but also won the Ladies' Match. In the first case he made a score of 95 points, and in the Ladies' Match scored 32 at the 200 range. Full details of the scores will be published in a subsequent issue. The weather conditions were all against high scoring. The shooting started at ten o'clock in the morning when it was blowing almost a gale from the right of the range, and was inconstant in force. Later on it moderated, but became less certain in its direction, being of the fish-tail character so dreaded by riflemen. Colonel J. Allan, of Covehead, was Range Officer; Capt. Bruce Duck of the city being also present. Good sportsmanship and camaraderie prevailed throughout the meeting and the occasion was an enjoyable one for all who participated. At one o'clock a greatly enjoyed tea was served in the club bungalow on the range. The shooting was concluded about half past four o'clock in the afternoon. The day was wound up with the club's annual supper at night, a function for which the ladies of York were responsible. A recherche repast was done justice to, and the proceedings were brimful of bonhomie; a fitting wind-up to the day's sport.
