EVENING ENJOYED—An enjoyable social evening was spent by students at Zion church hall last evening, the entertainment being given by the Students' Christian Movement, which is doing splendid work in this direction.

TO ENTER JESUIT COLLEGE—Mr. Leo Merritt of the Royal Bank staff, has resigned his position and left on Wednesday morning for a brief visit at his home in Springhill, Nova Scotia, before entering Loyola Jesuit College, Montreal.

MILK TESTS IN ST. JOHN—Charges of watering milk are being preferred against several milk producers in St. John, who send supplies to the city by the sub-district Board of Health. Lactometer tests showed that the quality of milk was below standard and investigations were made with the results that three cases would be prosecuted in the city court on Friday and some other cases would be brought before the County officials. In the recent milk cases taken up in the Charlottetown Police Court no reflection was cast upon the vendors that the milk had been watered.

FIRE DRILL—Students at St. Dunstan's and the city schools were visited by Fire Marshal E. H. Beer and others yesterday in connection with the observance of Fire Prevention Week. The students at St. Dunstan's were addressed on the fire danger of carelessness and a fire drill was very satisfactorily carried out in the city schools. The following was the time taken to vacate each school: Queen Square—520 scholars—1 minute, 40 seconds. Upper Prince Street—460 scholars—1 minute 20 seconds. Rochford Square—about 400 scholars—3 minutes, 30 seconds. At this school the fire escapes only were used. West Kent Street—450 pupils—1 minute, 10 seconds. From this it will be seen that in case of fire, parents need have no fear of their children. They are in capable hands.

R. O. P. INSPECTOR HERE—Mr. H. H. Churchill, Yarmouth, N. S. of the Dominion Department of Live Stock, is making his dairy inspection trip through the province in connection with the record of performance milk tests. There are twenty-nine herds taking this test throughout the island and they show a very satisfactory average. The number of individual cows taking the tests has increased about one hundred percent over last year. The champion cow Donora 4th, belonging to Mr. Alex. Agnew, Royalty, is leading. Mr. Churchill, who is stopping at the Revare Hotel, has been coming here in connection with dairy inspection work for the past nine years. The Maritime provinces have hitherto been covered by himself and Mr. W. A. B. McDonald, of Edgerton. Recently however an island appointment has been made, Mr. A. A. McNis, of Red Point, having been appointed.

ons: if at any time an enemy should attack us they become a first class line of defense. "Let us give these boys a chance to acquire that training which rightfully belongs to them—these lads that are inclined to take to the sea," he appealed. "We stand four square for Empire. We recognize that we are enjoying liberty, security and justice in this country. Therefore we advocate not only development of our merchant service, and Canadian ports for Canadian goods, but also a navy sufficient to maintain our dignity and standing among nations as the Empire has for one hundred years and more maintained. Trafalgar, won in 1805, gave us such security that we have never had cause to worry about it until Jutland. We are in danger of forgetting that prosperity is only for the free and liberty for those who are willing to fight for it."

In closing Mr. Harris quoted from the stirring lines of Canada's Hymn of Empire. The meeting, which was presided over by Rotarian Percy Pope, an officer of the Charlottetown branch of the Navy League, was largely attended and Mr. Harris' remarks were received with warm expressions of approval. There were a number of ladies present including members of the Daughters of the Empire, to whose services during the war a fitting tribute was paid by the chairman. Solos by Miss Lucy Blanchard formed an enjoyable part of the programme.

Covey Discusses Residence Rule

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 11—The famous six months residence clause recently adopted at the annual convention of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, at Vancouver recently, in effect is a five months residence clause, according to A. W. Covey, President of the Maritime Provinces Branch Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, in an interview last evening on his arrival home after attending the annual sessions and at which the honor of being elected as first vice-president was conferred on him.

"This rule has been in effect for many years throughout Canada, with the exception of the Maritime Provinces," Mr. Covey said. "What was done at Vancouver was to make the rule applicable to our section. Briefly, it means that an athlete must reside in a town prior to June 1, for basketball; and prior to August 1, for hockey. It goes into effect at once. The rule of course has modifications. College athletes are exempted and legitimate transfers are accepted. The rule has been adopted to eliminate the camouflaged amateurism. I think it will be effective."

Regarding the Canadian team for the Olympic games next year, Mr. Covey announced that a trial meet would be held next spring at Montreal when the cream of the amateur athletic world in Canada would be gathered together. Mr. Covey was named a member of the select committee, consisting of F. Marples, Winnipeg; J. Morkin, Winnipeg; P. J. Mulqueena, Ontario; A. Tennant, British Columbia, and himself.

The guiding principle adopted in selection of this Olympic team will be that not necessarily winners will be picked but that the men who make the most promising showing. We cannot afford to send men over to France, who we are certain will not make the best showing possible for Canada," explained Mr. Covey.

While in Toronto, Mr. Covey learned that the Toronto Granites, who will compete at the Olympic championship hockey games, will leave for the other side about January 11 from St. John. He immediately got in touch with Granite officials regarding an exhibition game here before they embark. Mr. Covey is confident that the game will be arranged.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 11—The feature of the closing day's programme of the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association's 51st annual meeting was expected to be the Lexington Stake for two-year-old trotters, but it developed that it was the 2.09 pace which required four heats for a decision and was a keen race, going to Donna Mace.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 11—Three of the crew of the British steamer Daghigh were killed and several others injured in an explosion of a boiler while the ship was proceeding down the Delaware bound from this city to Sydney in ballast.

Sir Louis Davies is About to Resign

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Oct. 11—Sir Louis Davies, Chief Justice of Canada, who has attained the age of 75, and is entitled to the maximum judicial pension, is said to be ready to retire. His superannuation can be arranged to his liking. His position is different from that of the ordinary judge. As Chief Justice he is also deputy of the Governor-General.

Formerly two separate salaries were paid, but when the judges' salaries were increased a few years ago, these two votes were consolidated into one of \$15,000 per year. It is understood that Sir Louis is quite ready to retire if his superannuation is based on the larger amount, but the interpretation of the law in Government circles would restrict the pension to proportion of the judicial salary.

The Chief Justice, while attending to the judicial duties, is still of physique, and it is said would welcome retirement. In the event of his going the two judges mentioned more prominently for the Chief Justiceship are Judges Duff and Anglin, though it is also believed that an outsider may be appointed.

QUEBEC, Oct. 11—A report from Ottawa to the effect that Sir Louis Davies, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, is on the eve of resigning means that a second vacancy on that court, Hon Justice Brodeur's resignation being effective from next week, when it is expected he will become Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec. The vacancy created by the departure of Sir Louis Davies will be filled, likely by a representative of the Maritime Provinces, while that of Mr. Justice Brodeur by some one from this province. It is said in the same report that both Eugene Lafleur, K. C., and Aime Geoffrion, K. C., of Montreal, have been approached and that the latter is now considering the offer.

In Quebec it is believed that Chief Justice Sir Francois Lemieux of the Superior Court, has been mentioned as a possible nominee for the Superior Court, but His Lordship has not accepted Hon. Jacques Bureau, Minister of Customs, has been suggested also, but it is now learned that he will remain in politics until the next federal elections, and will not even go to the Senate. Hon. George Elie Amyot, M. L. C. or George Patenaude, M. P., being the successor, it is said, to the late Senator Godbout.
