The quarantine has been lifted from the Prince Edward Island Hospital much to the relief of the nurses. Miss Margaret Smith, of this City who is a graduate nurse of the Newport Hospital, Newport, R. I., is spending her holidays with her sister Mrs. C. W. Fisher in Montreal.

Mrs. S. W. Crabbe, City, has been elected president of the Ladies' Aid Society of the First Methodist Church. Many friends in this City will express much sympathy with Miss Marion Wathen of Harcourt, N. B., in the loss of her mother whose death occurred on Feb. 17.

The cargo by the Minto yesterday to Pictou included 87 packages meat, 210 packages smelts, 45 carcasses pork, 75 cases milk and other sundries. On Wednesday the young people of Vernon River enjoyed a leap year skate in the open air rink. As the ice was in excellent condition, about two hundred skaters assembled.

It is understood that the schooner Eva May, ninety tons, now lying at Peake's Wharf, has been purchased by Capt. Davies and Wm. Dean from Capt. Farrow. At the City Police Court yesterday morning three Prohibition cases were disposed of. George Essory was convicted of third offence and sentenced to six months imprisonment. The case against Herman Essory was dismissed. A. J. B. Mellish for both defendants. P. S. Brown was convicted of a first offence and fined \$100 dollars or three months. J. J. Johnston for defendant. In this case the defendant confessed, stating that he was not responsible, but that the sale had been transacted on his premises.

Considerable changes have been made in the Summerside hockey team since the last game in this city and an even stronger team than that which handed out the first defeat to the season to the Victorias will meet the Abbies here tonight. This in all probability will be the best game of the season as it is like a last chance for the Crystals to win.

In tomorrow's issue of The Guardian will appear a sermon by Rev. Hammond Johnson, pastor of the Methodist Church, at Summerside. This sermon is one which the gentleman preached, recently in Charlottetown. It is on the text, "Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ." It is a thoughtful analysis of the governing principle of religion, and deserves thoughtful perusal.

Mrs. Wallace McLeod, of Vancouver, B. C., arrived this week, to pay a visit to her husband's relatives at the home of her brother-in-law, St. A. McLeod, Grafton Street west. Her husband, will be well remembered by many readers of this paper. She is accompanied by her three children, two of whom are twins, aged fifteen months and who stood the long journey from the west like experienced travellers.

With regard to the work of the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, the work of the cow testing associations may possibly interest Guardian readers. The records of two associations in the province of Quebec are full of interest. In one association the highest yield of any cow in a certain herd during six months, June to November, was 132 lb. fat. In a neighboring herd the best yield was 200 lb. fat or a difference of 68 lb. fat. This is a difference in the earning power of these two cows of at least seventeen dollars in six months. This is not a contrast between a good and a poor cow, but between the best cow in each herd. In this case twenty cows of the one kind equal forty-four of the other as regards value of product. Why should not the returns from scores, yes hundreds, of dairy cows be increased by seventeen dollars? They could be very easily if farmers were fully alive to the possibilities of systematic improvement. In another association a more startling difference is discernible. In one herd the best cow yielded 450 lb. fat during the full period of lactation, while the best cow in another herd gave only 141 lb. with butter fat at twenty-five cents per lb. the one cow is credited with \$112.70, and the other with only \$35.32. This is a difference of \$77.38 between these two cows. Assuming that the cost of feed is the same in both cases, and in \$30 lb. it will be found that twelve cows in the one case would equal one hundred and eighty-eight of the other.

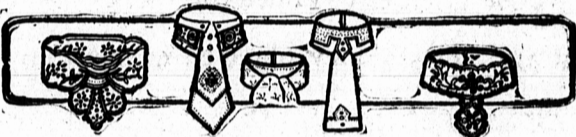
