Tax Experts to Discuss Wide Range of Problems

(United Press)

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, Va., Sept. 28.—Both state and federal tax problems will be under discussion by experts when the 16th annual conference on taxation is held here under the auspices of the National Tax Association beginning September 24. Notices already received of the appointment of delegates indicate that virtually every state in the union and the provinces of Canada will have official representatives here for the five days sessions. Like previous gatherings, the conference will be open to all persons interested in taxation problems. A discussion by former Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois on the control of expenditures and tax limitation is announced by A. E. Holcombe, secretary of the association, as one of the principal features of the meeting, and is expected that in the discussion much will be brought in concerning the former governor's work in connection with economies in state administration. The "tax free" amendment proposed to the federal constitution will be one of the subjects to come before the delegates for consideration. This discussion will be led by Representative Ogden L. Mills of New York. This is the first time that West Virginia has been host to the conference, and in keeping with the association's practice, special attention will be given to that state's taxation, including the developments in West Virginia's business and professional tax, generally referred to as the "sales tax." Federal taxes will be discussed and President Thomas S. Adams of the association, who is professor of political economy at Yale university, has announced that his address on "Revolution versus Evolution in Federal Tax Reform" will give his views on the need of revision of federal taxation. Others expected to participate in the discussion of federal taxes include W. R. Green, chairman of the committee on ways and means of the house of representatives, Representative Mills, McConzie Moss, assistant secretary of the treasury, and Kingman Brewster, of the committee on appeals and review of the income tax bureau.

Jury Returns "No Bill" on Piracy Case

BOSTON, Sept. 28.—The federal Grand Jury which has been investigating the case of the ramrunner British schooner J. Scott Hankinson boarded last August by pirates who wounded the Captain and cook, returned "No Bill" today.

The schooner was eighteen miles off Cape Ann. The Grand Jury reported that no evidence sufficient to warrant the indictment of any person was laid before it.

Greeks to accept Decision of Ambassadors' Council

ATHENS, Sept. 28.—It is announced that the Greek government will accept the decision of the Allied Conference of ambassadors awarding the Greek indemnity deposit of fifty million lire to Italy.

A note to this effect will be handed the French Minister today and will express regret that the ambassadors conference did not await the termination of the international inquiry into the Janina massacre before making a decision.

"Bloodless Surgeon" Praises Discovery of Dr. Banting

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Dr. Adolph Lorenz the Venese "bloodless surgeon" returned to the United States today to resume clinical work and visit patients he treated when here previously.

Stronger Protest To Admission of Canadian Cattle

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, Sept. 28.—Lord Strachan presiding yesterday evening over a meeting of the Central Chamber of Agriculture suggested that the government's reason for admitting breeding cattle from abroad into England was based on the possibility that the Duke of Devonshire would resign his post of Colonial Secretary unless the course which he recommended was followed.

Several of the members supposed the pledges were made by the duke's predecessor in office and they flatly accused the government of breaking other promises.

The Duke of Devonshire continues to uphold the stand he had taken on all along that breeding cattle from Canada should be admitted, but the meeting passed a resolution condemning this action and protesting in even stronger language than before against such admission.
