Land and Road Tax for 1910 may
be paid at the Provincial Treasury,
Charlottetown, up to the 30th Novem-
ber, instant, but not after that
date, except for the Royalty of Char-
lottetown for which no Collector is
appointed. Collectors will continue to
receive taxes at their places of resi-
dence or offices respectively up to the
15th December. Immediately there-
after they proceed to demand and col-
lect the taxes remaining unpaid. Un-
less the amount is then received by
the Collectors they must leave a no-
tice demanding payment within four-
teen days. Executions are issued im-
mediately after the expiration of the
fourteen days. No taxes are allowed
to become in arrear as formerly.

JEWS ENTERING INTO POLITICS.

TORONTO, Nov. 26.—That the Jews
of Toronto are fully in earnest with
regard to having special representa-
tion in the Dominion and Ontario
Parliaments and the Municipal Coun-
cil was proven last night at a meet-
ing of the Citizens' Independent League
in the Lyric Theatre on Agnes
Street.

The gathering was large and the
declaration of each speaker that the
time had come to cut loose from
both political parties was received
with enthusiasm. Mr. Speigel was in
the chair, and on the platform were
many Jews who have hitherto been
prominent in "the ward" as Conserva-
tive or Liberal workers.

Several speakers delivered them-
selves in English, but the majority
spoke in Yiddish, with frequent in-
terlarding of Anglo-Saxon phrases.
The tenor of all the addresses were
the same; both parties had played
fast and loose with the Jews to get
their votes and neglected them after
the campaign was over. A number
of them seemed actuated by animus
against Jacob Cohen, J.P., because
of his allegiance to the Conservative
party, but Edmund Bristol, M. P.,
and T. C. Robinetta, K. C., also pro-
vided shining marks for the orators.

Robert Kurtz said the league
would choose its own men in parlia-
mentary and municipal elections.
They would listen to Liberals, Con-
servatives, Socialists, Labor repre-
sentatives and Nationalists, but
would have their own candidates.

"I am as good as any Englishman
living," said Louis Gurofsky, "and
there are Jews in this country who
would make better finance ministers
than either Mr. Pildring or Mr.
Foster," he announced. "If I couldn't
beat Tom Whiteside in Parliament I
would quit business."
