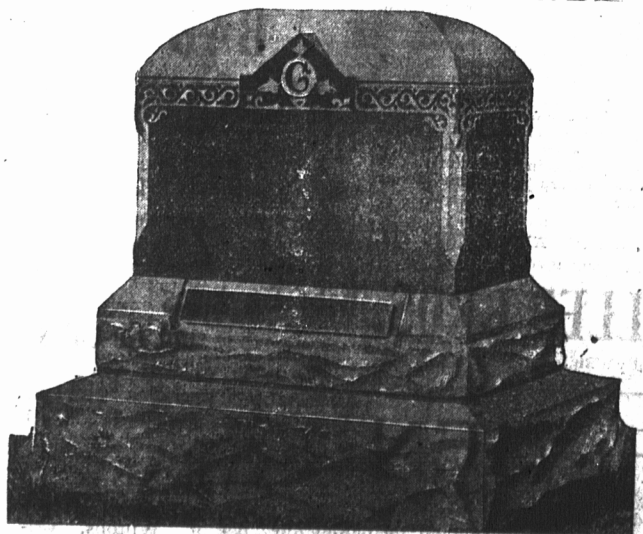

Treble sorrow over death has been brought into the family of the late Peter Taylor of FreeTown within the past month. Yesterday morning about half past six o'clock Mrs. Joseph Lewis of this town succumbed to an attack of gripal pneumonia, which disease carried away also her young brother Scott Taylor on May 2, and her father Peter Taylor on May 17. The late Mrs. Lewis had been ill only a few days and was 38 years of age. The sorrow stricken husband and three young daughters besides a bereaved mother, two brothers and five sisters have the heartfelt sympathy of the community in their irreparable loss.

The brief report in yesterday's issue of the drowning accident which happened on the North Shore on Monday afternoon was followed yesterday by the dreadful particulars of the sad affair by which Harry Best youngest son of John Best of Lot 16 met a watery grave. It appears that the unfortunate young man in company with his brother Herbert were returning from their lobster traps, while a strong gale was blowing, and the boat swamped in the heavy sea. Observers on shore watched the boat coming and finally noticed that it had disappeared. At once two boats were despatched to the scene to render assistance. With considerable difficulty on account of the rough sea the boats made their way in the direction of the accident. For some time it was thought that their efforts would be in vain as no traces of either boat or men could be found; but finally in the distance was seen a spot on the water appearing like a buoy and only discernible at intervals in the tossing waves. With all haste the rescuing party urged to the spot which proved to be the almost lifeless body of Herbert Best, clinging to the top of the mast of the sunken boat. He had held on to his brother as long as he possibly could and was about on the verge of surrendering himself to the angry billows when his rescuers came. He says that he could not possibly have held on two minutes longer. He was brought to the shore unconscious but after a short time revived and told the story of his thrilling experience grappling with death. The body of the drowned man has not been found. Deceased was about 22 years of age and leaves a father, mother, three brothers and two sisters to mourn, who will have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of friends.

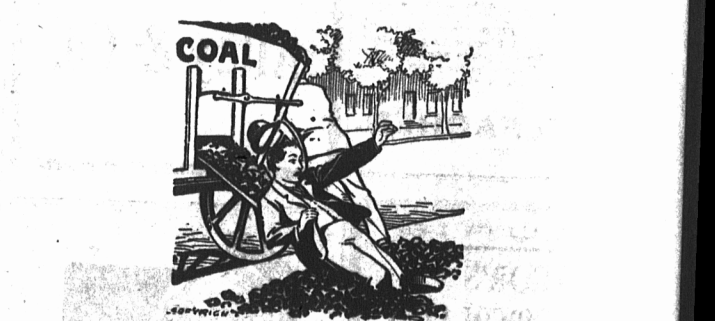
OF PERSONAL INTEREST.
