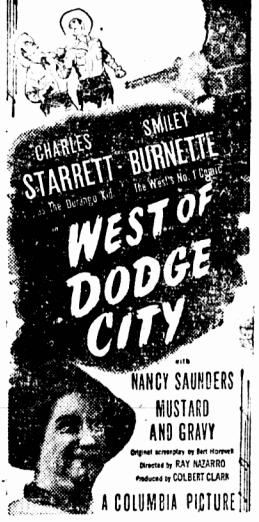

Since the Hospital Ladies Auxiliary has completed its summer program, the final week has been turned over to the Legion for the purpose of raising funds for their projects. With the final completion of the dances, the floor is to be raised and the ground levelled prior to the curling season.

On Nov. 29th, the shooting season on duck and geese came to an end. The season, as far as the hunters were concerned, was a poor one. It seemed as if the elements themselves were against the hunters, owing to the fine weather which prevailed during most of the season. Hunters in this locality had been looking forward to the month of November with great anticipation, only to be disappointed by the weather. The season opened with such beautiful weather that after the first morning it was difficult even to find any in the dams or lakes. Many hunters were hopeful that the ducks would move to the narrow rivers and creeks, but once more they were disappointed. Almost all felt that it was unwise to start the partridge and duck seasons at different times, owing to the fact that the shooting of partridge during the ducks which were thus proportionately difficult to shoot when the season opened. It is hoped that next season the two dates will coincide, thereby giving the hunters a better opportunity to acquire some ducks which so few did this year. There is, however, a prospect of feeding grounds for the ducks. It is unfortunate that with the abundance of wild rice being present in Plaquemine Pond, some effort is not made by the Fish and Game Association to have some of it sowed in various other localities, thereby increasing the number of feeding grounds. With such a prospect, it is not surprising that many more hunters would be able to enjoy duck shooting which is at present practically confined to those possessing a car. Hunters in this locality are beginning to give this matter serious consideration, and it is quite possible that next spring may see some effort to get permission to transplant

some of this wild rice. With Pheasants Unlimited doing such excellent work in increasing upland game, it is unfortunate that similar work is not being done to increase the number of breeding grounds for trout. The erection of a few dams in selected spots would prove to be definitely beneficial, while the placement of fish ladders on already erected dams would give immediate aid to the question. In this locality there are at least four dams any one of which is suitable for the erection of a fish ladder. Fishing enthusiasts here have already discussed the question to some length, and it is expected that next spring negotiations will be undertaken to have one of these ladders erected in this section. It is hoped that next season's fishing season will turn out better than this year's shooting season which was disappointing to all.—Lan.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1 — (CP)—Ottawa's population has dropped by 1,086 within the last year, Assessment Commissioner Blyth MacDonald said today in announcing that there now are 164,366 persons living in the Capital city. He attributed the decrease to the fact that a number of persons unable to find housing accommodation within the city, have moved into the suburban areas.
