# Wheat Rise Reflected At World Parley

## New Spirit Felt To Be Entering World Trade

### BELIEVE TIDE TURNED

Conference Delegates Follow Ticker Quotations Eagerly.

(By George Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Writer.)  
LONDON, June 27.—(C.P. Cable) While the forces are gathering behind the scenes of the World Economic Conference for a renewed struggle over the gold standard, a new spirit is entering world trade.  
Continued rise in commodity prices gives impetus to the belief the tide has turned at last. Dollar wheat at Chicago today with reports of small crops both in Canada and the United States eased the situation which a setback in negotiations to limit production had made increasingly difficult.  
But the gold standard struggle is going to be a bitter one. The threat

## Wheat Soars Six Cents In Bullish Upheaval

WINNIPEG, June 27.—Despite the heavy profit taking sales which poured into the pit in the last few minutes, wheat futures prices finished nearly five cents above yesterday's close on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today. During the bullish upheaval prices rose to heights they had not touched for nearly three years.  
Shooting six cents higher in a wild outbreak of trading 10 minutes before the final gong, futures lost only a little more than a cent in the closing flurry, finishing 4 7/8 to 4 3/4 cents higher, July option at 79 3/8, October 81 3/4-82 and December 83 1/4-3/8 cents.

## Roosevelt Still Fog Bound

LAKEEMBANS BAY, Roque Island, Maine, June 27.—(A.P.)—Domestic and international problems seemed like child's play to the President of the United States today as he sat patiently waiting it out with an inexorable fog.  
It teased with Franklin D. Roosevelt for the second day, slightly lifting at times and then, when hopes were raised high, rushing back with renewed thickness.  
Norman H. Davis, Chairman of the American delegation to the Geneva Arms Conference, was creeping up on the Maine shore early tonight in the heavy mist to deliver a report to the President and to receive special instructions in return.

## Government Policies Indorsed At Association Meeting

### Full Attendance Of Delegates At Enthusiastic Annual Meeting Of East Prince Conservative Association—Mr. D. B. MacDonald Re-elected President.

The annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal-Conservative Association held yesterday in Summerside was very largely attended, there was a full representation from each district. Both Federal and Provincial Parliaments were well represented, the members all giving able addresses.  
The meeting which opened shortly after 2 p. m. continued until nearly 6 o'clock. The President, Mr. D. B. MacDonald, presided.  
Mr. John H. Myers, M. P. for Queen's County, was present as was also Mr. J. F. Arnett, Conservative federal candidate for Prince County in the last election.  
The Provincial Government was represented by Hon. G. S. Sharpe, Hon. Thomas McNutt and Hon. A. P. Arsenault. Messrs. Thomas Wigmore, M. L. A., Heath Strong, M. L. A., were also present.  
Mr. Myers was the chief speaker and gave a masterly address in the course of which he outlined the work being done at the present World Conference. He spoke optimistically of the benefits which would come to Canada and of the part that the Hon. R. B. Bennett is taking as a world statesman. Mr. Myers also discussed at some length the question of tariffs between Canada and the United States. He was loudly applauded when he spoke of the faith which he had in the Conservative party and the part it has played in the building up of Canada, as well as in the mastery manner in which Canada, under the Bennett Government, is meeting difficulties brought on by the present world wide depression.  
Hon. G. S. Sharp and the other members also spoke at some length and were enthusiastically applauded.

## Disarmament Parley Prepares To Adjourn

GENEVA, June 27.—(A.P.)—Adjournment of the World Disarmament Conference until October 16, with private conversations among powers continuing in the meantime, was recommended today by the Steering Committee. The Conference will meet Thursday to confirm this decision.  
Disarmament received a death blow, is the way spokesmen of some smaller nations commented on the agreement and there is a possibility they will raise objections Thursday. The Conference originally planned to resume its work next week.

## Collision At Sea Reported

NEW YORK, June 27.—A collision at sea between the Newfoundland steamer Corner Brook and the trawler Sloe, four miles northeast of Highlands light, was reported in a message picked up by radio marine corporation tonight.  
The message, addressed to the coast guard at Boston, asked for "immediate assistance."  
It was signed "Evans, Master." The position given apparently referred to the Highlands light off Boston harbor.  
The Corner Brook was last reported sailing from Newport News June 13 for Dalhousie, N. B. She is of 5,756 gross tons and is owned by the International Power and Paper Company, of Newfoundland.  
The trawler Sloe is not listed in available shipping records here.

## SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT YESTERDAY

### Ernest MacCallum, 12, Lost His Life At Brackley Beach, After Floating Beyond His Depth On a Raft.

A very sad drowning accident occurred at Brackley Beach yesterday about 12:30 when Ernest MacCallum aged 12, son of Mrs. Hubert MacCallum floated beyond his depth on a raft while bathing and lost his life in attempting to reach the shore. His brother Eric, and cousin Jimmie, who were bathing with him were unable to rescue the drowning boy. It appears that the unfortunate lad had floated beyond his depth on a raft, which was capable of bearing only one person at a time and that he became alarmed and jumped off the float.  
The Mounted Police were at once summoned and instituted a search for the body, which was discovered about 1:30 yesterday afternoon.  
Coroner, Dr. L. B. McKenna visited the scene of the tragedy, and after viewing the remains decided that an inquest was unnecessary.  
The deceased is survived by his mother, Mrs. Hubert MacCallum, and by eight brothers and sisters, to whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy in their bereavement. The cousin, James MacCallum, who is visiting at Brackley Beach, is a native of Winnipeg.
