WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—The United Nations food and agriculture organization said Saturday that northern hemisphere harvests have turned the tide against post-war world starvation. But food production, it said, still lags far behind world needs. The report, to be presented to the fifth session of the F.A.O. annual conference convening here Monday, emphasized the gap between the living standards of rich countries and poor ones. "The trend over the last decade," it said, "has been that the well fed 10 years ago are better off than before, and the poor fed, for the most part, worse off." Representatives of 58 countries are gathering here to see if they can find some way of getting farm surpluses to the hungry to help solve the world's food problems. The meeting will be held at a time when some countries are turning to crop control measures to prevent surpluses, despite the fact that much of the world is undernourished. This situation exists largely because shortage areas lack the money to buy surpluses of other areas.

Two Big Problems

The F.A.O. report said that the countries of the world face two big problems in their battle against hunger. One was said to be the need for supplying underdeveloped areas technical aid aimed at helping them increase their own food production. The other was described as the need to clear the way for expanded trade in farm products. Standing in the way of such expansion, the report said, are currency barriers. Director-general N.E. Dodd of the F.A.O. will lay before the conference a plan for making surpluses help relieve hunger.

His plan calls for creation of a world food bank or clearing house. In broad outline, the clearing house would be like a public corporation, with a \$5,000,000,000 capital contributed by participating countries.

It would buy and sell surplus commodities offered by producing nations. Transactions would be made either at special cut-rate prices or regular commercial prices. Countries able to pay in acceptable or convertible currencies would get the surpluses at the special prices. Countries paying in currency unconvertible at present would pay the regular price. The clearing house would hold such currencies to the credit of producing countries until increasing world trade and restored convertibility of currencies permit gradual clearing of the accounts.

Jap Whaling Fleet Sails for Antarctic

TOKYO, Nov. 20 (Reuters)—The 10,800-ton Japanese whaling factory ship Hashidate Maru, with a crew of 1,000 and eight catcher boats, left Yokohama today for the Antarctic whaling grounds. The fleet will be joined later by four refrigerated ships.

16-Year-Old Sentenced To Be Hanged For Murder

NAPANEE, Ont., Nov. 20 (CP)—Alfred Childs, 16-year-old farm laborer, Saturday night was sentenced to be hanged Feb. 10 for the hayfield slaying of Elijah McQuaig, 57, here June 29. A jury deliberated two hours before finding him guilty of murder after a week-long trial. Childs, described by witnesses at the trial as a crack rifle shot, showed no emotion when Mr. Justice John L. Wilson pronounced sentence. McQuaig died as a result of four bullet wounds when he was shot while working on the farm of a neighbor, Archibald Davis, near this town 30 miles west of King-

Survivors of B-29 Picked Up By Haida

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Nov. 20 (AP)—Eighteen survivors of a B-29 crash arrived here today, rescued from the sea by the Canadian destroyer Haida.

Given Ovation

Hundreds of spectators appeared as the Haida entered the harbor and cheers rose into a great ovation both for the survivors and the crew of the ditched B-29. The survivors were transferred from the destroyer to the crash boat which was used as a photographers' boat. First man off the Haida was Capt. Joseph A. Petrosino, the navigator of the ditched B-29.

End of Search

The survivors were taken from the chill waters of the Atlantic last Saturday by the Haida, not 10 miles from the spot where the search co-ordinator said they would be. It was the culmination of one of the biggest air-sea rescue hunts in history.

Crowded Into Rafts
