A correspondent of THE GUARDIAN in Hampton writes:—In one of those sad, hopeless letters that follow a bereavement, Mrs. Robertson was pained on reading that her lamented brother, who had entered on a high technical examination shortly before entering the hospital, had not received the returns from London while in life. They came just after he had passed away to appear before the Judge of all; and while his lone brother and sister were in supremest grief they read their brother's name in the Honors Grade. Of course this was anticipated of Mr. Marshall, though he spoke lightly of it himself. But while they thus read of him amidst their tears they were thinking of him and having just read his "title clear to mansions in the sky," and having heard the words "well done good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." As I, in a quiet island home, picture the sorrowful group, among whom was the professor of the Technical College, though uninvited, standing with uncovered heads around another open grave in the spot we know so well and so sadly—it all seem so hard, so very hard! "But now we see through a glass darkly".

FOR practical Christianity the Salvation Army furnishes an example to most of the denominational bodies of to-day. Founded 35 years ago, the Army now has its flag flying in 47 countries; it has 7,200 societies, 14,000 officers, 40,000 lay officers and 17,000 bandmen. The War Cry is printed in 30 languages, and the gospel is preached in 40 different languages. In one year they have furnished beds to 4,000,000 persons, given meals to 6,000,000 and helped 36,000 to obtain work. This is a record which speaks volumes for a people who were once ridiculed in almost every civilized country as a lot of cranks and fanatics, and had great difficulty in securing the privilege of working in some Christian countries. Gen. Booth is entitled to as much glory as almost any great military genius who has gained victories on bloody fields. Booth's war is against wickedness, and does not involve blood shed—a war of upbuilding and not of destruction.—The Salvation Army works in an humble sphere, and while its methods do not appeal to all our tastes there can be no question that thousands of men who had lost all self-respect, and almost given up in despair, have been by them reclaimed from the lowest depths of degradation and made useful citizens.—Toronto World.

### STRANDED

In Spanish Waters Leads to Trouble.

### THE STRIKE SITUATION

Steel Kings Gaining Ground—Steamer Explosion Kills Eleven Men.

BRITISH SAILORS IN AN ENCOUNTER.  
MADRID, August 29.—(Special).—While the British fleet in Spanish waters was manoeuvring to-day a torpedo stranded opposite La Linea.

The man of war's men sent to get it were opposed by Spanish carbiners but the landing party, strongly reinforced, overawed them.

THE STEEL STRIKE.  
PITTSBURG, August 29.—(Special).—The strike situation is unchanged, although the indications are that the Steel Corporation is slowly but steadily increasing its forces.

STEAMER'S BOILERS EXPLODE KILLING 11.  
PHILADELPHIA, August 29.—(Special).—The boilers exploded in the steamer City of Trenton, killing eleven and injuring thirty others.
