 est part of her existence. She has
 been in failing health for some time
 and although everything was done
 to alleviate her sufferings, she pass-
 ed to her eternal reward. Mrs.
 MacDonald was truly a woman
 among women, of sterling character,
 sincerely motherly in her affections,
 she had always a cheerful smile
 with which to greet her numerous
 friends. She bore her long illness
 with Christian fortitude, and was
 never known to complain. She was

 man Catholic Church and was vis-
 ited frequently during her illness by
 her pastor, Rev. O. Kiggins, who
 administered to her the last rites
 of the church. Her husband pre-
 deceased her by some years. She
 leaves to mourn their loss, one sis-
 ter, Mrs. Thomas Richards, of Al-
 berry Plains, one son, Captain Ed-
 ward, and two daughters, Maimie
 and Bessie, who were present with
 her at the time of her death. May
 her soul rest in peace.

 Trinity (Anglican) on 19th of Feb-
 ruary were for the Sunday of the
 Church's year, that of Sexagesima
 Sunday. Captain Albert Wittig,
 C.A., conducted the services and in
 the morning preached from the

 be lifted up" (St. John 3:14). Re-
 calling to the minds of the congre-
 gation this interesting event in the
 history of the Israelites, Capt. Wittig
 compared their journey through the

 ness in comparison to the life here-
 after. Even as the Israelites suffer-
 ed many hardships, became dis-
 grunted and eventually sinned
 against God, so do we, and God is
 never at a loss to find some ways
 and means of bringing to their sen-
 ses all those who forsake Him. The
 uplifted serpent was the remedy
 provided for the Israelites' salva-
 tion and the crucified and uplifted
 Christ is our salvation. We too are
 bidden to look and live, looking
 unto Him, who is our Spiritual
 Remedy, our Great Physician and
 Bread of Life. In the evening, Cap-
 tain Wittig spoke from Revelation
 4, and his solo "The Saviour of the
 World," was much appreciated by a
 fairly average congregation. Miss
 Rose Fairchild officiated in a very
 capable manner at the organ.—A.
