MEN, HORSES AND VEHICLES.

The good citizens of Milton did a very proper and sensible thing when they decided to meet together and invite their representatives and the automobile owners to meet with them and talk over the question which is exciting so much interest in the rural districts surrounding the city. The representatives of the district in the Legislature did not attend the meeting. They ought to have been there and their absence needs an explanation. Politicians call meetings and expect the people to attend them. When the people call a meeting and invite their representatives it is not courteous for the public man to stay away.

Mr. Rogers, a representative automobile owner, a good citizen and widely known business man, took pains to be present, and was deputed to speak for Mr. Jost as well. He was most courteously received, most attentively listened to, and his presence went far toward bringing harmony out of a rather strained situation. His address and his replies to questions were couched in the most friendly and conciliatory spirit and could not fail to have relieving effect upon the apprehensions that had existed.

Much of the trouble that arises in the minds and imaginations of men and of horses in both town and country comes of misunderstanding of their fellows and of the situation. To begin with the horse, he imagines that the street roller, the bicycle and the automobile are his enemies, and is alarmed. Did he but know it, the steam roller is making a smoother road for him and the cycle and the motor car save him many a weary mile of travel. In due time he learns at least that they are harmless, and he passes them by with but slight notice. It is much the same with men, even with the most intelligent, and the quickest way to get rid of wrong impressions is for the opposing interests to meet together in friendly discussion of the situation.

The tone and temper of the Milton meeting was excellent, largely owing to the fact that it was made up of fair-minded, intelligent and reasonable men, and was presided over by one so genial, so wise and so diplomatic as the Venerable Archdeacon Reagh. No man could have stood more loyally by his parishioners and the people of his community than did he, and yet while maintaining to the last the right of the people to the use of the streets and highways, without being made afraid or exposed to danger, he recognized fully the legal and moral rights of owners of motor cars.

All present at the meeting recognized that what the people of Milton could do was merely to give a strong and clear expression of their sentiments and opinions. They could not make or change the law of the land, or interfere with the common law rights of any person. Doubtless many of them would gladly have the horseless vehicles shut off the public roads altogether, as a measure of safety. But this they did not ask. They asked in their resolution that on Sundays and market days the auto cars should be kept out of the way as far as possible. This was consented to by Mr. Rogers, on behalf of himself and Mr. Jost before the resolution was introduced—they could not speak for others.

We believe these assurances went quite as far as anyone had expected, or hoped they were conceded in a spirit of friendliness and good feeling and gained

for the automobile owners in this city the respect and confidence of those who heard them. We believe and trust that great good will come of the meeting. A better understanding exists, a greater sense of security and a growing confidence that in the not distant future the automobile will become as familiar and regarded with as little fear as the bicycle now is. We who know the owners of the auto cars now running, know how very careful and painstaking they have been and will be to give as little trouble and excite as little fear as possible among those they meet on the way.

In business or pleasure the tastes of men vary. One delights to drive a fast, or spirited horse; another prefers a quiet horse. One finds pleasure in walking, another in a yacht, or a motor boat, a bicycle or an automobile. Each of these is a legitimate source of pleasure, or of utility in business. What seems desirable is that each shall be free from needless restraint, and that all shall be animated by a spirit of good will and a desire to interfere as little as possible with the rights and enjoyments of others. That disposition is being now exhibited, and it is pleasing to record the fact. In a brief space the automobile will be better known to the horses and the latter will not fear it; the automobile owner will also be better known to the horse owner, and they will regard each other with mutual friendship and respect.

There are serious hints of trouble brewing between Britain and Turkey in Egypt, not without suspicion that the hand of Kaiser William is at the bottom of the new pretensions set up by the Sultan.

The people of San Francisco are by no means of one mind with the President in regard to his refusal of foreign donations. No doubt the United States is rich enough to rebuild the stricken city, but present help in an emergency is always welcome and it seems ungracious to refuse it when so freely and generously offered.

The Russian elections have resulted in the return of a large majority of moderate reformers to the National Assembly, strongly opposed to the autocracy on the one hand and to anarchy and revolution on the other hand. This gives hope for the future that the liberties of the Russian people may be expanded and secured by constitutional rather than by violent means.

Moncton is ambitious of distinction and notice, and properly so. It is a growing and progressive town, the headquarters of a great railway system and the possessor of the biggest bore in all Canada. Therefore when some thousands of Monctonians assembled at the depot with their Mayor at their head flanked by the Premier of the Province and cheered themselves hoarse to attract the attention of Prince Arthur in his car, and the Prince did not respond or show himself, Moncton feels aggrieved. This is but natural. Prince Arthur would do well to explain himself. High positions have their obligations as well as their privileges. King Edward has a happy reputation for always doing the right and the fitting things at the right time. His example should not be lost on lesser dignitaries in the great British Empire.
