### INTERESTING LECTURE TO FOX MEN

An intensely interesting lecture was delivered before the Sunjio Fox Breeders Club, at the Summerside Town Hall, Friday evening, Sept. 4th, by Professor Oscar Erf, of Ohio State University.

Although Professor Erf has been interested in the Silver Fox for the past 18 years, and consulting for some of the larger fox farms in the United States, his remarks were confined mostly to general conditions affecting animals in regard to diet deficiencies.

The Professor points out that as the land is being slowly but surely depleted of minerals over long periods of cultivation, the grasses and hays in return are being gradually lowered of these same mineral constituents. In turn the animals that feed on these hays and grasses, as cows, horses and rabbits, are also being deprived of these same minerals, which are so necessary in balancing the body requirements. Deficiencies in any single mineral or vitamin in the body of the animal, whether it be the cow, fox or human body, leads to deficiency diseases through lack of resistance. As an example of such deficiency disease, the Professor told of 38,000 head of cattle which he brought from western United States in 1934 due to drought. Arriving in the eastern states, it was found that 35% of these cattle were blind. The reason was that these cattle had had no green materials or grasses since the previous year due to extreme drought. Owing to the fact that in the green of the grass, carotene is present which in turn stores up Vitamin A in the cows' livers and which is the disease resisting vitamin. These cattle were affected with blindness due to the lack of this particular Vitamin.

Again the Professor pointed out that milk from cows fed on hays improperly dried show very little Vitamin A. In turn the child or the fox drinking the milk cannot get the proper Vitamin A requirements from such milk. Therefore it was concluded that the fox, which is dependent on meat and milk from animals eating the grasses, is often deprived of necessary minerals and vitamins for proper functioning of the reproductive organs, and of the hair growth. Too little emphasis, it was pointed out, is laid by the fox ranchers on the source of the meats we are feeding our foxes. In order to guard against deficiencies, additional minerals and vitamin foods should be used continuously by the fox ranchers. A very important point was brought out by the Professor, that the fox should be fed continuously and not intermittently. The Professor pointed out that his experiments on feeding he does is carried out at least 4 or 5 years, and stated that he would like 8 or 10 years more on top of that to determine any results accurately.

Professor Erf holds the basic patent on artificial hair drying, and through his efforts the past 20 years, today there are 59 hay dehydrating plants in operation in the United States drying hundreds of tons of hays which are used for winter feeding, and which hold their vitamin units much the same as green hays. These dehydrated hays pass on through the cow, milk or meat rich in Vitamin A for the children or the fox during the winter months.

At the close of the meeting, a hearty vote of thanks was extended to the Professor for his enlightening remarks.—S.

### CAPT. LEGGETT PAYS VISIT TO SUMMERSIDE

Captain Leggett, Supervisor of Traffic Montreal, paid a visit to Summerside on Saturday and made several suggestions that he considered would help the Police Department to handle the heavy traffic congestion on Saturday night.

Captain Leggett was met at the Civic Building by Mayor Robinson and introduced to members of the Town Council. Council have a meeting at 8 o'clock on Monday night. King, Capt. MacDonald of the R. C. M. P. and other members of the Police Force. Captain Leggett discussed in an informal way many problems with regard to traffic regulations and made some valuable suggestions to the Council Board, which will be brought up at the regular meeting of the Council on Monday next.

Among the most important changes suggested by Captain Leggett was the need of a suitable parking space for cars, near the business section of the Town. He stressed the importance of having parking spaces quite near to the business houses, as it is a great inducement to people to do business where they can park their cars with safety near at hand. The Council have a place in mind that they thought they could procure. The place would be well lighted and under police supervision. The matter will come up before the Council on Monday.

Another suggestion made by Captain Leggett was that the gas tanks on Water Street should be removed, as they obstruct the parking space. The curb should be put back at least two feet on each side to widen the street sufficiently to allow cars parked to pull out without interfering with the centre lane of traffic. Captain Leggett did not think cars should be parked over the curb as far as they are, or preferably not at all. He was greatly surprised at the well-paved streets of the town, the beautiful shady trees and well laid out gardens. He considered that the town had progressed very rapidly and its citizens might well be proud of it. He felt that the Police Department were doing very well in handling the traffic problem, with the means at their disposal. For a town of its size, the traffic was immense and the present system totally inadequate to take care of it properly and with due regard to the safety of life and property.

He was told that there have been as many as 98 cars parked on the south side of Water Street on a Saturday night, and about 300 parked somewhere in the vicinity of Water Street. Taking in the moving traffic, there would be over 500 cars in Summerside on a Saturday night. The small Police Force handled the situation very well and it was a credit to them that there are few accidents, but there were many things that could be done that would assist the police at times of congestion.

Many of these things would cost money and would have to be discussed by the Council and duly considered.

Captain Leggett pointed out that the town grew in size and importance, new traffic rules and regulations must be made to keep step with improved conditions and increasing population.

The suggestion of removing the silent policemen was not gone into as Captain Leggett had to return to Charlottetown early in the evening; but he has arranged an interview with Mayor Robinson and Chief of Police King for Tuesday at the C. N. R. Hotel, Charlottetown, when the matter will be brought up.
