St. John's Exhibition Management
Has Secured Brilliant Attrac-
tions in This Line.

ST. JOHN, July 30.—The dis-
play of fireworks at the St. John
Exhibition, September 12-19 prom-
ises to be magnificent. The execu-
tive has spared no pains or ex-
