### LIBERALS BURKERS

This motion constituted a simple demand from the Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier that the proceedings of the Public Accounts Committee should be free from what the Liberal Manitoba Free Press today calls "gag rule" and appeals "to narrow, contemptible technicalities in order to prevent the production of evidence." It was an appeal for the ordinary justice which is freely granted the Liberal party and the public by the Borden Government today. But Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the so-called disciple of Fox, of Gladstone and Bright, got up in the House and brazenly asked his followers to vote it down, which they did.

#### LOST HIS COURAGE

Previous to the election of 1908 Sir Wilfrid Laurier toured the West. The colossal expenditures on the Transcontinental forced him to adopt an apologetic attitude, and in a moment of bravado he declared that he courted the fullest investigation. But at the following session of Parliament he seems to have been better advised by the men who placed office above the national good. Throwing the Liberal leader at his word Mr. Lennox (now Justice Lennox) moved that charges of over-classification and over-payments on the N. T. R. be investigated. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who had been very brave on the hustings in the West, lost his courage, and again at the crack of the party whip his followers voted down an investigation.

#### AGAIN DENIED REQUEST

In 1909, the Hon. C. J. Doherty, the present Minister of Justice, moved by the charges of corruption and graft with which the whole country reeked, made a personal appeal to Sir Wilfrid Laurier to shield the good name of the nation and concluded by moving this resolution:

"That in order to lift the cloud of suspicion that rests upon the administration of the various departments, to satisfy the demand of the country for honest and business like methods, and to purge the Public Service of inefficiency, recklessness and corrupt practices, it is advisable and necessary in the public interest that a thorough and untrammelled investigation be made by a competent business commission into the workings of all the great spending departments of the Government."

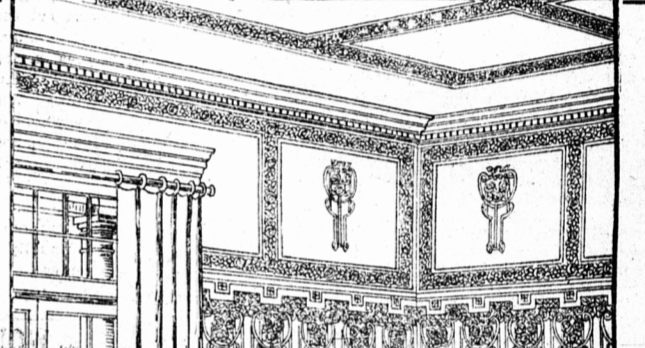
