TRACADIE CROSS SCHOOL FAIR Monday, Oct. 4th, was a decided success and embraced the schools Donaldston, Blooming Point and Tracadie Cross with Misses Stella Morris, Annie McDougall and Jeanette Coady as respective teachers. Considering the small number of schools participating, the exhibits were of an excellent quality and equalled, if not exceeded, in quality and quantity that of any other fair in the inspectorate. Coffee and cake served by the ladies filled a big want on occasions of this kind, and was well patronized, the proceeds going towards the School Fair Fund. The judging was capably done by inspectors Doyle and Court, Miss Helen McKenna, and Mr. D. L. Giddings, Charlottetown, who awarded prize cards to the winning competitors. Before dispersing to the field to indulge in the usual sports excellent speeches were delivered by Rev.
