60 CUPS OF TEA

Bellevue Hospital attempts to Cure a Victim.

REDUCED TO THREE CUPS

And The Patient Goes Off On a Tea and Cigarette Debauch.

New York, July 7.—Bellevue Hospital's tea fiend, Alister Digney, after enjoying six hours' liberty, returned last night. IMPERIAL DEFENCE

The Recent Trend of English Opinion

COLONIES MUST SHARE.

Claim Made in Parliament That a Readjustment is Needed.

TORONTO, July 8.—The Globe's cable correspondent writes:—In a recent I wrote about hearing a couple of casual grumbles along the street about the colonies claiming a large share in the conduct of Imperial affairs without sharing in the burden involved. The grumble has now got into Parliament. The other night speaking on the bill for the appropriation of £4,000,000 for military works, Mr. E. Robertson, the member for Dundee, remarked:—"The hon. gentleman had said that the Empire was to be defended as a whole, and to that general principle he thought no exception could very well be taken. But there was a corollary to that, namely—that if the Empire was to be defended as a whole the expense of that Imperial defence should not be borne entirely by the home country. (Cheers.) It should rest in part upon adequate contributions from those outlying parts of the empire whose defence as a whole they had undertaken hitherto." Mr. Robertson is a Radical and the cheers came from that side of the house mainly, but there is another matter to which I would refer presently. The present point is that a claim has been advanced in Parliament that a new principle should be laid down as regards the provision of Imperial defence. It is likely to be heard again every time a similar measure comes up, and it will be surprising if before long we do not hear it on the platform in connection with some by-election. The new era seems to be developing rapidly. Should the principle laid down by Mr. Robertson catch the popular attention there will require to be a very speedy readjustment of the relations which have existed between the self-governing colonies and the mother country. It is inconceivable that the former should be taxed for Imperial defence without representation to the Imperial Parliament. More than that, it is doubtful if they could contribute a reasonable share without seriously impairing their power to develop rapidly their various resources, and colonists, at last, will recognize the fact that the development of these resources is important to the Empire.

DRIVEN INSANE

Because of Prediction of Fortune Tellers.

SETS FIRE TO CLOTHES

And Defied Her Imaginary Enemies to Follow Her.

New York July 8.—Driven insane by the predictions of her death in the cards of the fortune tellers, Mrs. Marie Amie-Gordiol burned herself to death. Soaking her clothes with kerosene she locked herself in her home, No. 234 Hancock Avenue, Jersey City, yesterday, set fire to her garments and defied her imaginary enemies to follow her. Three hours later she died in the Jersey City Hospital.

Several times each week Mrs. Gardiol visited fortune tellers. She would ask trembling of her future. Each time she was told the cards foretold misfortune, misery and death. Secret enemies were said to be at work. She was warned against poisoners.

When Mrs. Gardiol became ill and neighbors prepared delicacies for her she refused to eat them. She alarmed her children and husband by her insanities. Several weeks ago her husband forbade her calling on the fortune tellers.

She brooded over the predictions. When her husband went to work she sent the children out to play and then set herself on fire.

B. Hayes Falls into

BUCKET OF HOT WATER

All Efforts by the Doctors to Save Her Life Were Fruitless.

ELLERSLIE, July 11.—A dreadfully sad accident happened here about 10 o'clock Saturday in which little Mable, the three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. B. Hayes lost her life. Mrs. Hayes had taken a pot of hot water from the stove and emptied it into a bucket, with which she was going to scrub, and while in the pantry for cold water, Mable, who had been playing with her brother, accidentally fell backwards into the hot water. Drs. Long and McLaughlin were at once sent for but to no avail, and as the evening's shadows were falling little Mable's spirit fled to that far off land from whose hours no travellers return.

Mr. and Mrs. Hayes have the sincere sympathy of the community in this sad and sudden bereavement. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place Monday afternoon to the Methodist Church, Revs. W. R. Pepper and Wm. C. Murdock conducted the service, which was very impressive. The casket was literally covered with flowers.

ISLANDER SUICIDES

Formerly Belonged to Bay

A DREADFUL SCENE

His Body Found By His Wife Hanging in The Cellar.

Word has been received by Mr. H. A. Dingwell, of Souris, intimating the death by suicide of John MacKenzie in San Francisco, California, who formerly belonged to Bay Fortune, King's County.

Coming in from his day's work in the evening, he took the cord from one of the window blinds, went down to the cellar and hanged himself.

His wife who also belongs to Bay Fortune, going down to the cellar shortly afterwards, found her husband dead and she fainted away. Their only daughter then came to the awful scene and thinking both her parents were dead, became terrified. Her screams attracted the neighbors who restored Mrs. MacKenzie to consciousness.

New Teachers For Mount Allison Ladies' College.

The position left vacant by the resignation of Prof. Bruno Oetking, who has been appointed to a professorship in the State University of Colorado in Denver, has been filled by the engagement of Prof. Clarence De Vaux-Royer, of New York. Prof. Royer has had the advantage of study under some of the world's greatest violinists, such as Halir, of Berlin, Yeaye in Brussels, and Marsick in Paris. He has also had a brief period of study with Joachim.

He began his musical education at the early age of nine, and played in concerts when he was eleven. He has a thorough knowledge of Harmony. His wide interest in musical literature is indicated by the fact that his library of violin compositions and technical works number nearly three hundred volumes.

The number of pupils taking vocal culture has so increased under the popular direction of Miss Gilder, that it has been necessary to employ an additional teacher for that department. Miss Edna Van Vliet Higby has accordingly been engaged to fill that position.

It is confidently expected that these two teachers coming as they are, so highly recommended, will prove a strenuous to the institution.

A larger number of applicants than usual at this date have been received for rooms, and the prospects of the Mount Allison Ladies' College were never brighter for a good year's work.
