POTATO PRICES DROP.—The movement of potatoes from the Maritime Provinces, particularly Prince Edward Island, continues heavy and Monday twenty-four cars passed through the city bound for the United States. This morning four carloads arrived from Buctouche for export. In spite of the movement, however, there continues to be a good many potatoes in the country districts, trouble in transporting them to the city accounting largely for the apparent shortage, farmers in the city on Saturday said. The price dropped from \$3.00 to \$2.50 a bushel during the hours the market was opened on that day.—Moncton Transcript.

Livestock Market (Canadian Press) MONTREAL, April 21.—(Dom. Live Stock Report)—Fresh receipts of Livestock on the two markets this morning amounted to 18 cattle, 393 hogs and 337 calves. In addition there were a number of cattle left over from Monday and yesterday. Sales were confined to common cattle, mostly cows and prices ranged from \$3.25 to \$4.50. Calves were in good demand and straight

lots of ordinary quality sold from \$6.75 to \$7.25, and better grades in straight lots for \$7.50 and \$7.75. A few small lots were picked up at \$8.00. Hogs were unchanged at \$14.50 as the ruling price and one of two sales a shade better.
