Offices in New Prowse Block Charlottetown.

An agitation has been started in Ottawa to have Thanksgiving Day fixed for the last Monday in October. It is claimed that this would allow persons to have three days with their families, who would not be able to get home for Thanksgiving Day if it were held on Thursday as has been customary. Representations have been made to the government on the subject and they will receive due consideration.

NORTH SYDNEY HERALD: The tourist travel to Cape Breton this year has shown a marked falling off compared with previous years. At no period this summer have the principal resorts been crowded, and as the season is advancing it is evident for some unaccountable reason the American visitors were not attracted in such numbers to the provinces. The loss to Cape Breton as a result of the decreased tourist trade is considerable.

FOUR Cape Bretoners were ordained to the priesthood at Antigonish on Tuesday. The ordination services were conducted by His Lordship Bishop Cameron. The following young Cape Bretoners were raised to the Holy Order: Adrian Butts, Sydney Mines; Donald Beaton, Mabou; Patrick Le Blanc, Margaree; and J. J. McKinnon, Bailey's Brook, Antigonish, and W. J. Ryan, Canso. This was the largest ordination in the history of the diocese of Antigonish, and the services were witnessed by an unusually large number of people from almost every parish in the diocese.—Moncton Times. (Father Le Blanc is a brother of Mrs. T. White, City.)

AFTER the shooting of the Nova Scotia Provincial Rifle Association held last week was over a meeting of the officers of the different corps was held and as the result a notice was posted to the effect that the Intercolonial Railway having refused for the first time to grant passes to riflemen from Nova Scotia meeting to attend the D. R. A. matches; therefore, resolved that the Nova Scotia Rifle Association do not send a team, or any team to compete in the D. R. A. matches at Ottawa, and the conditions and programme concerning Ottawa teams are hereby cancelled. This was signed by Major Flowers, secretary.

ONTARIO flour has gone down fifty cents per barrel in the past two weeks and there is some hope that it may be still lower. The first cut was on Aug. 8th, and it was thirty cents. Another reduction of twenty cents per barrel was made on Thursday of this week; and the wholesale price is now \$5.05, the retail being \$5.30. The cause of this is the abundant crop of wheat in Ontario. Last year that Province produced only between eight and nine millions bushels, and as western wheat was very largely used in the production of Ontario flours, this kept the price up so that the Ontario and Manitoba flours were almost even. But now a crop of upwards of twenty-three million bushels is reported in Ontario, it has been on the market for some weeks, and the price is falling. Manitoba flour is now selling at \$6.15 wholesale.—St John Sun.

The St. John Sun speaking of W. V. Newson, M. Sc., City, who has recently been appointed Professor of Physics etc. in Alberta College, Edmonton, says:—Mr. Newson is a young man, about twenty-six or twenty-seven years of age, and has had a brilliant record as a student. He went through Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown and from there took the B. A. degree in McGill. Later he went back and got his M. Sc. degree in a post graduate course, and returning to Charlottetown became principal of West Kent street school, which position he but recently resigned. He had intended going to Chicago to take a further course in science, but received word from McGill that Prof. Hiddell had applied to the college for a science man and that he had been recommended. Mr. Newson will, in Alberta College, be instructor in physics, chemistry and physical geography, with arithmetic possibly added. The college is affiliated with McGill. Mr. Newson will begin his work in the west on Sept. 20th.

After marrying in Worcester, Mrs. McINNIS removed to Prince Edward Island, where she remained until the death of her husband and then returned to Worcester in 1880. She is survived by three daughters, Sarah Jane, wife of James B. Coulson, circulation manager of The Post; Ausline M., wife of Robert Wayne, Bungay, P. E. I.; Georgie M., wife of Peter Woll, Worcester, and two sons, Alexander J. McINNIS of New Haven and Harry J. McINNIS of Worcester; one sister Mrs. Mary McCluskey of Worcester. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in St. Paul's church. Burial will be at Prince Edward Island, where the body will be conveyed in charge of Harry J. McINNIS and Mrs. Ausline M. Wayne, who came to Worcester three weeks ago. The train will leave Worcester at 2.20 p. m. The body will be placed in the lot beside the bodies of her husband and two children. Mrs. McINNIS was very well known in Worcester, as she grew up here and returned to Worcester after the death of her husband. Nearly all her relatives live in Worcester.—Worcester, Mass. The twelfth convention of the Eldon District S. S. Association was held in the Methodist Church, Vernon River South, on Monday, Aug. 14th. In the afternoon devotional exercises were led by Rev. D. B. McLeod, whom all were pleased to see present. Mr. Larabee, Pres., occupied the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The roll-call was responded by the delegates from Cherry Valley, Belfast, Hazelbrook, Grandview, Newton, Uigg, Pownal, Lyndale, Vernon River South and Eldon. Excellent papers were read by H. W. Huntley and A. S. Nicholson which they were requested to have published. Rev. A. D. Archibald gave a very instructive black-board lesson on "How to Make the Lesson Interesting." Some of the aids recommended were illustrations and the imagination. He cautioned the teachers not to be satisfied with merely interesting the pupil but to strive to instruct him so that he might go out inspired to live the truth taught. At the evening session Rev. Mr. Hudson led the devotional exercises. Rev. Mr. Webb and Rev. Mr. Chowan spoke on the qualifications necessary that a teacher might be successful as a sub-winner. First of all he must be a Christian in belief, in experience and in example; he must be a firm believer in child-conversion; he must love his pupils and study their natures in order to win their affections. The Field Secretary gave an address in which he urged the parents and teachers not to deprive the children of their rights. They are entitled to the best mental and spiritual training that can be given in the school and the home. The theme of the convention was tendered to the people of Vernon River for their kind hospitality, to the choir for the music furnished, and to all who helped to make the convention one of the best yet held in this district.
