### France Hard Hit By Storms

PARIS, Sept. 28.—Damage by storms is reported from many districts in France and the grape crop has been seriously affected. It is estimated that this year's yield of grapes will not be more than half that of last year although until quite recently the grape growers had hoped for a bumper harvest. Throughout France there have been severe electric storms and some cattle and sheep have been killed by lightning.

### Found Dead In Cell

LONDON, Sept. 27.—A Canadian arrested here last night for alleged fraud and forgery at Barclay's Bank was found hanging dead in his cell at the Bow street police station where he had been detained.

No actual charge had been preferred against him. The man was later identified as Walter John H. Myers, alias John Hurley. He was born in Toronto.

OTTAWA, Sept. 28.—The New South Wales Board of Trade has just made a fresh declaration regarding the basic wages for the state. It has fixed the living wage for adult males at £4 4s. per week and for adult females at £2 2s. 6d. per week, being an increase of 2s and 1s, respectively. The reason for granting the advance is that there has been a distinct upward trend in the prices of commodities since the end of 1924.

### Intended to Retire

Capt. Vatcher, who had intended to leave the Inez G., at the end of her trip and retire from the sea, formerly commanded the steamer Herbert Green. He was also owner of the schooner Julia F. C.

The Inez G. left North Sydney on January 17 last for Demerara and took on a cargo of liquor. Since her return from the south she had had a distinct upward trend in the prices of commodities since the end of 1924.
