### THE SCOTT ACT REPEAL.

Yesterday was declaration day for the Scott Act election in Queen's County and the full return for each polling division is reproduced in another column of this issue. The total vote cast was 1,785, of which 1,571 were "Against the Act", and 214 "For the Act," giving a clear majority of 1,357 for prohibition. This is on the whole eminently satisfactory. The election was held at a busy season of the year, and as a majority for prohibition was assured from the first, a good many prohibitionists did not take the trouble to go to the polls.

The vote is not so large as we would like to have seen, but it is worthy of note that the Scott Act is repealed and prohibition brought in by a considerably larger vote than was cast for the Scott Act when it was first brought into operation in 1880. At that time 1418 votes were polled, of which 1317 were for and 101 against the Act. The recent vote is larger by 369 votes, and the majority greater by 130 than it was 26 years ago. These majorities are well distributed. In the two cases where the majority was for retaining the Scott Act the vote was very small—at Emyvale 18 to 9 and at Monaghan 8 to 5.

Queen's County has repeated with almost the same emphasis the strong vote before given by Prince and Kings. In any other election how crushing a vote of seven or eight to one would be. It would simply mean the annihilation of the defeated party. In the voting which has taken place in regard to delegating the liquor traffic we have the cumulative effect of many successive elections and plebiscites covering a quarter of a century in time, and practically two generations of voters. This shows the settled determination of our people.

These successive elections with prohibition as the issue have been at once educative and impressive. They have helped to keep the subject before the people, and to keep the weapons and armor of prohibitionist bright by use. They have demonstrated that it is good politics not only to enact a Prohibition Law, but to enforce it. And furthermore these strong votes and big majorities go to show that no more vendors are wanted and that licenses to other parties to sell liquors at wholesale in this prohibition Province must cease at once and forever.

There is talk of Parliament closing about the end of June. Perhaps a fortnight later may be a better guess.

The Toronto News remarks that as a deliberative body the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church "ranks with the Parliament of Canada. Its leaders are men of great vigor of mind and remarkable practical ability."

The late Premier Seddon was born to poverty and toil in England. He worked his way to New Zealand. There he became a Socialist, without ceasing to be an imperialist. In his time he put into effect more radical reforms than ever before emanated from one man. Among these were government ownership of railways, telegraphs and telephones, equal universal suffrage for men and women, state life insurance and old age pensions. It is yet too soon to pronounce a final judgment upon all these measures. But all the world is interested in the legislative experiments begun by the bold and able Premier on the other side of the world.

### HOW SCIENTISTS AGREE.

The recent earthquake called forth many opinions as to the causes of the disturbance. Nine or ten college principals and professors of eminence were invited to throw the light of their knowledge upon the subject and appear to have been quite willing to do so. No one of them hesitated, or admitted ignorance or doubt, yet their answers are quite irreconcilable and in some cases contradictory of each other.

One said the earth is cooling and the shrinking of the interior causes cracking of the exterior. Another said there was an upheaval in the centre of the earth. A third said it was due to the Rocky Mountains, which are gradually rising. The fourth that San Francisco is dangerously located and will always be subject to severe shocks. The next great man said the San Francisco trouble was due to the earthquakes now going on in Japan. And still another concluded that "the whole universe is wound up for disaster." Obviously they do not know, but as it is the business of scientists to know things, these men would not confess their ignorance. Very much of what passes for scientific knowledge is mere speculation.

## NOT SO DULL IN THE NORTH

OTTAWA, June 12.—The first witness at the special committee on the S.E. Arctic case this morning was Mr. Deschenay, the steward of the steamer. He was examined by Mr. Northrup and said that the Esquimaux came aboard daily at Ballintown were fed from the ship's supplies. There were about sixty of them. There were also taken on board furs which would nearly half fill the committee rooms. These furs comprised wolf, musk ox and white fox. The furs were transferred to the Neptune after the Arctic reached Shaler Bay and he never saw any of them since. Returning to the ship's supplies the witness said there were always weekly dances with the Esquimaux ladies on board. One week it was on the Arctic and then on the Era the American whaler. The Esquimaux ladies were frequently on board the Arctic.
