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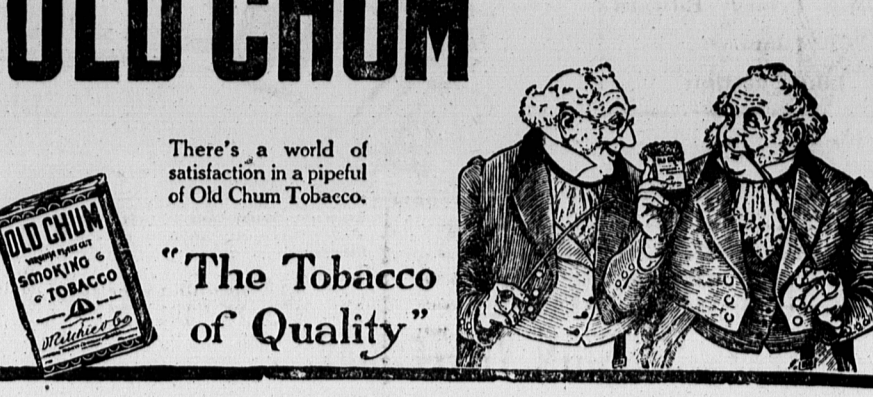

LETHBRIDGE, ALB., Sept. 21.—Captain E. L. J. J. J. has broken his hunger strike. This morning he ate some dry toast and drank some postum, served him at Galt Hospital, thus breaking his 42 day fast. INFLOW DECREASED
