THURSDAY.  
NEW BRIDGE.—The street work for the new bridge over Dunk River near Emerald, went forward by train yesterday evening. It will be put in place within the next few days by Mr. Cameron and his staff of men.

ARTISTIC SIGN.—At the end of their show-room Messrs. Bruce Stewart have erected a large artistic sign advertising the Overland and Ford automobiles. The lettering, which renders the sign elegant and attractive, was done by Mr. Edward Hollorn.

DELEGATES LEAVE.—The two delegates, Mr. Sidney Bonnell and Mr. Vans HeLean, to the world's Student convention at Kansas City left yesterday for Freetown where they will spend Christmas with Mr. Brewer Auld before proceeding on their journey. The boys expect to return to Charlottetown on January 8th.

MISLEADING.—The delegation which waited on Premier Matheson on Tuesday last, and which was referred to in yesterday's Guardian, was from Rocky Point, where the proposed ferry wharf and shipping pier is to be built, and not Southport as appeared. The delegation favor the old site rather than the new one surveyed by the Dominion Government engineers.

AT PRO-CATHEDRAL.—At St. Dunstan's Pro-Cathedral yesterday, (Christmas), the masses and vesper were at the same hours as on Sunday. At 11 o'clock a Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, Father J. Gallant, Dean of honor, and Father Duffy, sub-deacon of honor. Father Pius MacDonald was deacon of office and Father McQuaid sub-deacon of office while Father McLellan was master of ceremonies. A new three-part Mass, of St. Augustine, by Hanna, was admirably sung by the choir of the pro-Cathedral, which, reinforced by a number of young boy singers who took the soprano part of the mass. The children's choir rendered appropriate Christmas hymns during the investiture of the Bishop and also at the conclusion of the Mass. The choir was under the baton of Judge Blanchard and Mrs. Byron Brown presided at the organ. The solo of Adepte "Fidelis" and other Special Christmas selections were rendered in fine voice by Mr. W. J. Brown. The sermon for the occasion, which was a most eloquent and exceptionally forceful one was preached by Rev. Dr. G. J. McLellan, the pastor. In the evening at 7 o'clock Pontifical vesper were sung by Bishop O'Leary with Father Pius MacDonald as Deacon and Father Duffy as High Priest and Father McLellan, master of ceremonies. His Lordship also celebrated at Pontifical Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, assisted by the same priests.

EGG CIRCLE FORMED.—A very large meeting of farmers was held in Hope River hall on Monday evening, the 22nd inst. Mr. Benson was present and delivered a very interesting and instructive address on poultry and egg production. After a pretty full discussion by a number of farmers the meeting proceeded to organize an egg circle, and elected a board of directors to complete the organization and appoint a manager after which they will be prepared for business. Co-operation in this matter of marketing eggs is in the air and egg producers have at last taken in hand to reform the egg trade by sending forward promptly to the consuming centres, clean, fresh eggs that will command the highest price, and by cutting out the middlemen they will prevent the delay that spells disaster to the egg trade in the warm weather, and also save expense in marketing. Practical co-operation like this will be educative as well as profitable and will likely result in farmers extending the principle to other lines of their varied industry.

SCHOOL EXAMINATION.—The semi-annual examination of Hope River school took place on December 28. There were nine visitors present, including students from P. of W. and St. Dunstan's Colleges. The examination was conducted by the teacher, Mr. Joseph Hogan, assisted by Douglas Hogan and Claude Simpson. The scholars showed good proficiency in all the branches studied and by their good reading, spelling and prompt, intelligent answers to all questions as well as by their excellent order observed, reflected credit on the painstaking efforts of the teacher to bring the school up to a high standard. Appreciative remarks were made at the close by James Simpson, Walter Simpson and others, after which each pupil was presented by the teacher with prize packages containing candy and some other little wonderful curios.

RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.—An accident, the result of a runaway, happened to Mrs. McKenna, Grafton St., in Charlottetown about 11 o'clock yesterday morning. A horse owned by Mr. P. S. Brown, and attached to a light wagon started to run up Weymouth Street from the station at a swift pace. The animal on reaching Grafton Street turned the corner to the west with unslackened speed. A lady, Mrs. McKenna, who lives on Grafton Street, in the vicinity of the store of Messrs Coffin & Co., and who happened to be crossing Grafton Street, from Parson's Corner to Coffin's, was knocked down and run over by the horse and carriage. She was picked up unconscious and medical aid was sent for. Miss McKenna was severely injured about the head and badly shaken up.
