Enforcement officers, he said, have many times overlooked cases of men with political influence making fortunes through traffic in illicit liquor. Brookhart came to the support of Senator Harris of Georgia, in the latter's demand for the removal of Judge Paul J. McCormick from President Hoover's law enforcement commission. Referring to McCormick's assertion that search of private homes without warrants was an outstanding evil of resent; enforcement activities, Brookhart expressed impatience "with making the Government the criminal in enforcing the law and making heroes out of bootleggers."

PRESIDENT AND SENATOR BORAH HOLD CONFERENCE WASHINGTON, Dec. 27—Senator Borah's despair of ever enforcing prohibition "with the present personnel from top to bottom" today led to a personal decision on the inflammatory topic between him and President Hoover during luncheon at the White House. Not another subject was mentioned but details of the views exchanged were withheld both by the Chief Executive and Republican dry from Idaho. Having taken a leading role in the Hoover presidential campaign, through his emphasis of the prohibition issue, Senator Borah's Christmas Eve arrangement of the entire Volstead enforcement lineup has intensified the tension over prohibition in Washington.

The latest flareup was another re-echo to the Idahoan from the Treasury Department today. Under-Secretary Mills divulged plans for a unified border patrol and limitation of the number of Canadian ports of entry, as means to restrict smuggling liquors. He said the Treasury would submit these to Congress as soon as it names a joint committee to consider enforcement questions.

RESIGNATION DEMANDED WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—The resignation of Secretary Mellon was demanded as the first step in a "clean up" of prohibition enforcement today by Senator Norris of Nebraska, a Republican Dry, who aligned with Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, in condemning the personnel of the enforcement service. The Nebraska blamed "politics in the enforcement service for what he described as the "failure" of enforcement. When asked where he would start in resigning he replied quickly, "with Andrew W. Mellon." "I don't say the law is not enforced everywhere," said Norris, who is chairman of the judiciary committee "but I do say it is not generally enforced and I think there is evidence that the politicians are meddling too much. I don't think Andrew Mellon, who is the chief enforcement officer is in sympathy with the law."

HONORS PRESIDENT-ELECT RUBIO OF MEXICO (Special to The Guardian) WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 27.—President Hoover ignored precedent today to honor Pascual Ortiz Rubio, the president elect of Mexico. With Mrs. Hoover he visited the next chief executive of the republic to the south and Senora De Ortiz Rubio at the Mexican Embassy. It was the first time in history that a president of the United States had left the White House to honor a president elect. The act was a formal acknowledgment of life courtesies extended to Mr. Hoover when he toured South America as a president elect last year.

P. E. Islander Is Sask. Deputy

One of the best known public officials in Saskatchewan is Francis Hedley Auld, Provincial Deputy Minister of Agriculture of Saskatchewan. Mr. Auld is a native of Cove Head, Prince Edward Island, where he was born on June 14th, 1881. He was educated at Prince of Wales College, graduating from that institution in 1899. He entered the Saskatchewan Government service in 1907 as Secretary of Statistics. In 1907 he was appointed Superintendent of Fairs and Institutes, and in the following year was given the important post of Director of Agricultural Extension which he held until 1916 when he became Deputy Minister of Agriculture, a position which he had since filled with marked ability. Mr. Auld was Secretary of the Government commission which recently made an exhaustive enquiry into all phases of the grain trade. Mr. Auld is highly respected for his personal qualities and for his wide knowledge of matters pertaining to agriculture. He is president of the Regina Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition, and past president and director of the Regina Y. M. C. A.—Canadian Colonization, Montreal.

PROVINCE LOSES ESTEEMED CITIZEN

The Late Mr. W. A. Weeks Was Outstanding Figure in Mercantile History of Charlottetown.

In the death, reported in yesterday's Guardian, of Mr. William A. Weeks, this Province has lost one of its most esteemed citizens. The deceased, despite the fact that he had passed his 90th birthday, possessed remarkable mental and physical vigor and was up and around as usual until Christmas Eve, when he took to his bed, and since then he gradually grew weaker until his death on Thursday evening.

The late Mr. Weeks was the son of the late Joseph W. Weeks. He was born in Charlottetown on May 28, 1839. At the early age of fourteen he accepted a position as clerk with the late Charles Dempsey who conducted a business at the corner of Queen and Grafton Streets where the Canadian Bank of Commerce now stands. After an apprenticeship of five years with Mr. Dempsey he entered the London House, a large dry goods and general business establishment conducted by D. G. & S. Davies at the corner of Queen and Richmond Streets where the Royal Bank of Canada is now located. Here Mr. Weeks remained until the spring of 1891 when he formed a partnership with a fellow clerk, the late Joseph Davies, and opened a dry goods store under the name of Davies and Weeks on Queen Street in the building now occupied by the Carter Company Limited. On the dissolution of this partnership Mr. Weeks continued the business for a time in his own name in the same building and later in a new building on the east corner of Queen and Sydney Streets, having as his partner the late Mr. W. H. Findley, the firm being known as Weeks & Findley.

In 1876 Mr. Findley withdrew and Mr. James Paton entered the firm as a partner with Mr. Weeks. In 1885 the business was removed to the Brown Block and at this time the late Mr. Henry Weeks and Mr. A. W. Weeks were included in the partnership. In 1892 this firm sold out to Mr. James Paton and Mr. Weeks retired, from the dry goods business.

For some years afterwards Mr. Weeks and the late Mr. L. L. Beecham a large wholesale business, in Charlottetown under the name of Weeks & Beecham.

The late Mr. Weeks, for several years, was a director in the Merchant's Bank of Prince Edward Island and while its President in association with its directors he was instrumental in effecting an amalgamation with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the terms being entirely satisfactory to the shareholders of the Merchant's Bank.

The strict business habits he formed in boyhood and early manhood moulded Mr. Weeks' whole life, and gave him the high place in commercial circles which he held throughout his long, honorable, and successful career. In politics he was a strong Liberal. In the Provincial general elections of 1890, having as his colleague the late Mr. A. B. Warburton (afterwards Judge Warburton) he unsuccessfully contested Charlottetown and Royalty against Messrs. McLeod and Blake. In early life Mr. Weeks identified himself with the Prince Street Methodist Church and was a regular attendant at its services. As a teacher in the Sunday School and a member of the Official Board of the Church he always discharged his duties faithfully and well. At the time of his death he was the oldest trustee of the Methodist (now Trinity Church) Church, having occupied that position for over fifty years. He gave much of his valuable time and contributed liberally of his means to all the activities and interests of the church. He was generous and kind-hearted, modest and unassuming, and in him the poor and needy always had a true friend. On the 15th of May, 1867, Mr. Weeks married Miss Clarissa Preedy, daughter of Thomas Preedy of Charlottetown, who predeceased him June 12, 1898. He leaves three sons, Messrs. A. W. Weeks and Harry W. Weeks of this city, and Charles Weeks of Medicine Hat, one sister, Mrs. Lord, of Tryon, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Rooms of Charlottetown. His only daughter, Fanny, wife of the late Major Weeks, passed away a number of years ago. To the sorrowing relatives The Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

SUMMERSIDE, Dec. 27.—An adjourned meeting of the Summerside town council was held tonight with the Mayor presiding and all the councillors in attendance. The balance of accounts for the year, amounting to \$4,604.76 were passed. The tender of the Journal Publishing Company, the only one received for the printing of the town year book at \$1.95 per page was accepted. The draft of a bond in the sum of \$2,000 to be entered into by all parties having gasoline tanks on the street to indemnify the town from any damage or accident caused thereby which had been prepared by the recorder, was read and debated at some length. It was moved by Councillor Phillips and carried that the matter be laid over till the next regular meeting and that the recorder be asked to be present at said meeting. On motion of Councillor MacNeill it was resolved that a further grant of \$75 be made to the Prince County Hospital.
