LOCAL BRIEFS

The Latest News of the City and Province.

It is expected that the boiler and engine for the new dairy school building at Sussex will be put in place this week, by the build r, T. A. MacLean of Charlottetown, P. E. I.—St. John Sun.

The dead body of Mr. William Maltby, Chatham, N.B., was found on Sunday in a well in the cellar of his residence. Mr. Maltby was about 55 years old and had been employed on the I. C. R. for the last 25 years, but has lately been in delicate health.

A CORRESPONDENT writes: Mr. Hector McDonald, of Little Sands, died a few days ago, having been ill but a few days. Deceased was an elder in the Woodville Presbyterian church and was well and favorably known by a large circle of friends and acquaintances.—Mrs. Alexander McLean, of Heatherdale, is very ill with bronchitis. She has been ailing for some time, having received bad injuries in a runaway last July. As she is an old lady well on to 80 years, her recovery is hardly expected.

MR. ERNEST KEMP, of Brighton Road, has just received by mail particulars of his father's death, Mr. Frederick Kent, of Whiteable, England, in a collision at sea, resulting in the loss of the above and another man. The week before last Mr. Kemp received a cablegram stating his father was missing in a collision and has been anxiously waiting for particulars which have just arrived. It appears he had gone with his vessel the Sir Robert Peel, to Burham, in Essex, only 30 miles distant, for a cargo of English oyster brood to laid on the Whiteable Oyster Company's grounds, valued at £2,000 or \$10,000; when about half-way on the homeward passage at midnight on the 19th ult., with fine clear weather, a screw collier, the Dawson of Sunderland, ran into her, cutting her in two. The vessel sunk immediately throwing all hands into the water. A boat was lowered from the steamer which picked up two of the crew. The two men who were saved were below, and on being warned of their danger came on deck lightly clad, while Mr. Kemp and the other man were heavily clothed and had their boots on. Neither of them were seen again after the vessel foundered. It will be remembered that Mr. Kemp, who was an authority on, and an expert in the culture of oysters accompanied his son to Canada in 1892, inspecting the oyster beds of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, and during his short stay made many friends. He was 65 years of age and leaves a widow, four sons and four daughters to mourn his demise.

A BOSTON correspondent of the St. John Sun writes: Alexander T. Smith, John Smith, James Smith, Jacob Smith, Robert Smith and a variety of Smiths who came from New Glasgow and Pictou, N.S., several years ago, and who now reside in Woburn, this s'ate, think they are heirs to a portion of \$400,000,000 in the Bank of England. They base their claim on the fact that they are descendants of Gen. John Smith, an officer in the English army, who came out to Prince Edward Island about 1750. After his departure from the old country, his father is said to have placed to his son's credit in the Bank of England, a large sum, which has been growing ever since, until it has reached many millions. It is further said that General Smith was drowned in Nova Scotia by the capsizing of a canoe, and that he never knew of his father's action. David Smith of Barney's River, N.S., one of the general's descendants, heard of the money in the Bank of England, and a Thomas Smith attempted to get part of the money many years ago but their proofs were not sufficient. The Smiths of Pictou recently engaged a London lawyer to work on the case, and those of the family in Woburn assert that they will certainly get the money. But others are of the opinion that the family will long remain in their present moderate circumstances if they wait for the alleged Smith fortune in the Bank of England to enrich them.

SUPREME COURT.

The Supreme Court met yesterday morning for the purpose of giving judgment in the suit of George Montague Phillips vs. Alexander Gillis. The suit was commenced by writ of ejectment and the question for the opinion of the court is whether upon the facts, as stated, the plaintiff is entitled to any share or interest in the real estate of the late Wm. Dodd.

Under the provisions of the intestacy act of 1893, an amending act 51 Vic cap 6.

The following special case was stated for the opinion of the court by consent of the parties and by order of the Honorable Justice Hodgson, dated the 14th day of October, A. D., 1898, pursuant to the 170th section of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1893."

William Dodd, late of Charlottetown, in Queen's County, in said Province, Esquire, was in his lifetime and at the time of his decease, seized in fee of the land and premises described in the writ of ejectment. He died on the 16th day of June, A. D. 1898 without issue, and as regards the said land premises intestate.

Simon Dodd the father of the said William Dodd, predeceased the said William Dodd. He died on the fourteenth day of January, A. D., 1857, also intestate, but he left issue, him surviving, that is to say Thomas Walker Dodd, the said William Dodd, Jane Dodd, Sarah Small, Mary Crabbe, John Dodd, James Dodd, Simon Dodd, and George Dodd.

The said John Dodd, Simon Dodd, James Dodd, and George Dodd are all dead. They all predeceased the said William Dodd. They all died intestate and without issue.

The said Thomas Walker Dodd, Jane Dodd and Sarah Small are still living.

The said Mary Crabbe predeceased the said William Dodd. She died on the 12th day of December, A. D., 1897, intestate, leaving a son Simon W. Crabbe, and three grand children, viz.: the said George Montague Phillips, and Mary Hortense Helena Phillips, and Wendal Perley Phillips, children of her deceased daughter Sarah Jane Phillips, as her heirs at law.

The said defendant is now in possession of the said premises and due notice to quit and demand of possession has been given by the plaintiff to the defendant.

The defendant contended on the argument (1) That the plaintiff does not inherit any part or share of the property of the said William Dodd as a great grandson or descendant of Simon Dodd, deceased, the father of the said William Dodd, or otherwise, or under or by virtue of the Intestacy Act, 1873, or as the same is amended by the 51st Vic. Cap. 6. (2) That the plaintiff, although a great grandson of said Simon Dodd, deceased, is excluded under the provisions of the Statute of 1873, which provides that there shall be no representation amongst collateral heirs beyond brother's and sister's children and was therefore not entitled to any share in his property or estate.

The full court gave judgment in favor of the defendant, holding that the descent of the real estate was limited to the brothers and sisters of deceased Wm. Dodd and to Simon W. Crabbe as the representative of his deceased mother, Mary Crabbe.

Judgment was accordingly entered for defendants. For plaintiff, W. S. Stewart, Q. C.; for defendant, F. L. Hazzard, Q. C.
