In Memoriam Address And Presentation

MRS. MATHIAS LANDRIGAN. A long and useful life was peacefully ended on Thursday afternoon June 8th when she passed to her eternal reward. Mrs. Mathias Landrigan of Sturgeon. She was formerly Catherine Donohoe, daughter of Cornelius Donohoe and his wife Margaret Quinn, and was born eighty-seven years ago in Rosneath, where she spent the years of her childhood and early girlhood until she became the bride of Mathias Landrigan of Sturgeon. Together they built up a home which today stands as a monument to their industry and thrift. She had been active until about five years ago when her health began to fail and for her remaining years she was an invalid, tenderly and devotedly cared for by her daughter Elizabeth. During her illness she was frequently visited by her pastor, Rev. Father Mullaly, who administered to her the last rites of the Catholic Church of which she was a faithful member.

The late Mrs. Landrigan was an ideal Christian woman. Her home was a kingdom and her life was spent for the material and spiritual welfare of her children, who will always remember her as the most conscientious and self-sacrificing of mothers. She was also a kind and thoughtful neighbor, never too weary to lend a helping hand in times of sickness and trouble. Possessed of a cheerful disposition and gracious manner, many will remember the hearty welcome received and the pleasant hours spent in her hospital home.

The greatest proof of the place which Mrs. Landrigan held in the hearts of her friends was shown by the great number who called at her home during her illness and death and who gave spiritual offerings for the repose of her soul. Her husband predeceased her six years ago. She is survived by four sons, Rev. Cornelius Landrigan, Edson Alberta; Clement of Brooklyn, New York; William and John at home; two daughters, Mary (Mrs. Patricia Kenny, Lighthouse N.J.) and Elizabeth at home. A daughter Margaret died in 1927.

The funeral was held on Saturday morning, June 8th to St. Paul's Church, Sturgeon. Rev. Father Mullaly, assisted by Rev. Father Crook of Cardigan, conducted the service at the church and grave, after which the earthly form of this exemplary Christian woman was consigned to its last resting place, there to await the glorious resurrection promised to the just.
