Federation Favors Free Intercourse In Trading

(Canadian Press)

VANCOUVER, B. C. Oct 8.—"We ought to develop trade between Canada and the United States by every means, rather than hamper free intercourse, free barter and free trade," President William Green of the American Federation of Labor said when addressing a luncheon given by R. J. Cromie, publisher of the Vancouver Sun. "We have got to remember that you can't sell all and buy none."

In the international field, Mr. Green declared that there must be economic adjustments that will put the world's affairs on a more economic basis.

"Speaking for myself, and I do not imply whether my fellow executives agree or disagree with me in this, I would say that we must extend the war-debt moratorium that is now in effect; And I would say that ultimately there must be a revision. As we go further and further from the Great War we learn more of this and realize it more clearly. We realize that in war nobody wins and everybody loses."

"We ought, both Canada and the United States, seek to enlarge as far as possible trade in the Orient," President Green said. "There is a wonderful opportunity for us to capture those markets. The people of China and the rest of Asia are finding themselves and as their wants become more pronounced we will find a vastly-expanding market that will take our surplus goods from North America."

Canadians have no better friends than the American Federation of Labor, Mr. Green said, speaking of relations between the two countries.

Political reprisal was urged by speakers before the Federation meet, as inevitable unless the coming congress takes steps to alleviate unemployment. Labor also was lauded for its courage in attacking prohibition.

Defence Asks For Change of Venue

NEWCASTLE, N. B., Oct. 7.—A change of venue was asked by E. R. McDonald, of Shediac, N.
