IN MEMORIAM

MR. JAMES STEPHEN FARQUHARSON

The late Mr. Farquharson was born at Bunnbury, Lot 48, P. E. I., 11 years ago, and passed away on September 6th, 1924.

The deceased had not been in robust health for some time. He entered the P. E. I. Hospital in July where he was treated for a month, after which he was removed to the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal. There the best available skill proved unequal to the demands of his condition and in a month the end came peacefully as stated above.

Mr. Farquharson was a successful farmer, as his comfortable homestead would indicate. But he was also a fine type of citizen. For many years he was a member of the Methodist Church and also an official in that body. His place will not be easily filled. His home was noted for hospitality and good fellowship. The neighborhood will feel keenly his departure.

The deceased was twice married. His first wife was Miss Bessie Jones of Hazelbrook. To this union three of a family were given—Mrs. Callbeck, Summerside; Mrs. James Wood, Hazelbrook; and James Russell at home. Mr. Farquharson's second wife was Miss Annie Smith, Charlottetown. The above family with the widow survive to cherish the memory of a devoted husband and kind father. There are also two brothers Ernest in Charlottetown and Frank of California. One sister, Mrs. Patton of Vancouver, B. C., who was on a visit the past summer, also survives. The funeral was conducted on Sept. 9th from his late home at Bunnbury and was largely attended. The Clerical brethren present were Rev. Mr. Tilley in charge, and Rev. H. Pierce of Cornwall, a former pastor, and Rev. Mr. Lindsay of Hazelbrook. Interment was made in the little cemetery beside the Church where the deceased so frequently worshipped for many years.
