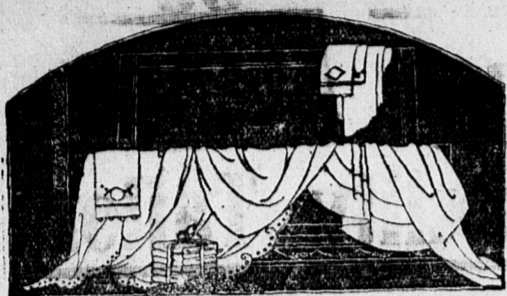

Basil King Says Canadian Writers Are Mediators

One of my pleasantest memories of the Canadian authors recent convention is associated with Mr. Basil King. It not only heard him speak a couple of times when he addressed his fellow authors, but I had the privilege of having two long conversations with him. Mr. King was brought up in Prince Edward Island. He studied for the ministry and belonged to that profession for some time. He was well on in years when he began to do literary work and feeling very grateful to Elias Carmen because that poet, also a mariner, was the first person to give him any encouragement. As every reader of contemporary literature is aware, the name of Basil King is now famous both in America and in England. During the last ten years the sale of his novels has become so large that he lives in affluence in Cambridge, Mass., next door to the stately old residence of the poet Longfellow. Mr. King told me that the blue blooded Bostonians do not use such a phrase as "the poet Longfellow." They say "Mr. Long fellow."

Those who have been reading Basil King's recent books will remember that he has been writing psychic stories. For some years he has been investigating psychical phenomena. His little book, "In Abraham's Bosom," is one of the most interesting stories, descriptive of the soul's experiences, that I have ever read. After a year ago Mr. King found a young girl in Boston who was able to do automatic writing. She wrote, presumably under spirit control, a long description of conditions of life which pre-empted in the other world. When Mr. King published this material in the Cosmopolitan magazine, and later on in book form, it attracted widespread attention. Mindful of this supposed revelation of the hereafter, I asked Mr. King the other day what was his present opinion of automatic writing, if he did think that the literary material might come from the sub-conscious mind of the writer. He said he could not say, but he was of the opinion that important results would accrue from further study of this mysterious gift possessed by certain persons. When I asked him to tell me what he thought of the books recently published by Mrs. Curran, of St. Louis, who says she is the amanuensis for Patience Worth, a Puritan spinster who lived in New England about 1649, Mr. King replied that he had read the literature, particularly "The Sorry Tale," with the greatest interest and said he was convinced that it could not be accounted for by ascribing to Mrs. Curran's sub-conscious mind.

Mr. King has been living in the United States for a good many years but is still a thorough Canadian. At the authors' banquet he gave one of the finest patriotic speeches that I have ever heard. In his address he urged that it is the duty of Canadian writers to explain British ideals to the American people. BRITAIN WILL NOT SEIZE GERMAN MONEY.—The British Government in an informal statement gave official sanction to forecasts that it would not alter its decision renouncing its rights under the Versailles treaty to confiscate German balances in English banks or German goods in English bottoms if Germany failed to carry out her treaty agreements. The statement was issued to counteract official German protests that by renunciation of these rights England placed herself in a position of not having the legal right to inflict the fifty per cent reparations penalty agreed upon at the London conference.

Last Respects To Cardinal Gibbons. BALTIMORE, Mar. 31.—Mighty and lowly united in sorrow last night and tread softly past the bier of Cardinal Gibbons to gaze for the last time on the face of a beloved prelate. Members of the guard of honor standing by the bier said were, as on previous days they had estimated the number of mourners at 30,000, today approximately ninety thousand persons viewed the body making a total of 150,000 who visited the Cathedral while the body rested in state.
