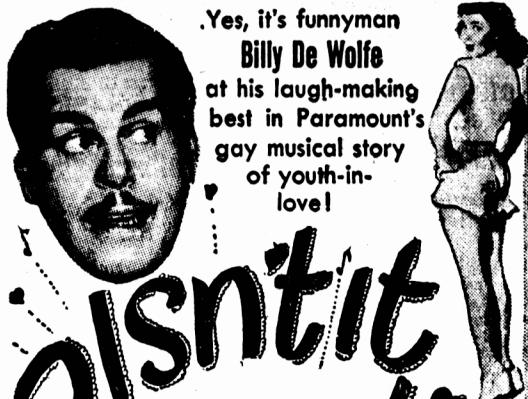

Mary Wickes' dry remarks add pepper, and Fay Baker, in an amusingly additional, interest to the proceedings.

"ISN'T IT ROMANTIC" GAY, TUNEFUL FILM

Set in a small Indian town, "Isn't It Romantic" tells the love-story of three attractive youngsters, played by the eye-filling Veronica, the precocious Mona (who will be remembered for her amusing portrayal of the letter-writing kid sister of "Dear Ruth") and the vivacious Mary (last seen as the spice-of-life "Variety Girl"). The girls' romantic problems are complicated by domestic difficulties rising out of their father's belief

that to work would be conducted by a gentleman of the Old South. Hiding behind the monumental—and never-ending—task of writing a book about the War Between the States, the old man manages to sidestep the job pitfalls prepared for him time and again by his daughters. Roland Culver plays the Major, whose devotion to the South causes a rift in the romance of his daughter Mary and Richard Webb.

Billy De Wolfe has the time of his life—and so will you, watching him—as Casper Milquetoastish young man hopelessly in love with the elusive Veronica. There is one sequence which deserves special praise in which Billy, assisted by Veronica and Mona, renders a number called "At the Nickelodeon," one of the funniest his-theatrical skits seen in a long time.
