AMPUTATES HIS OWN FOOT.

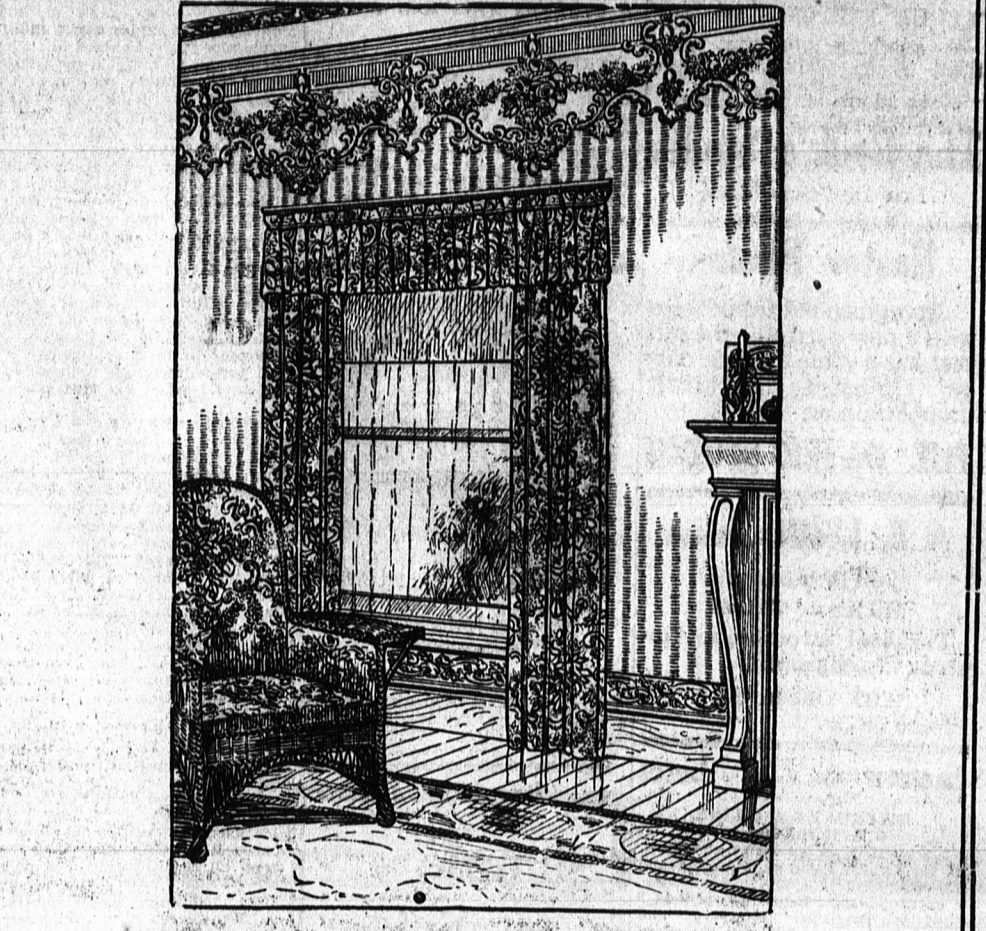

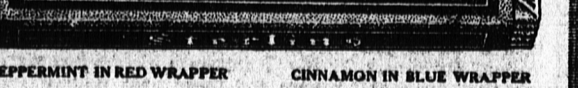
