Self Government Steps in India

GREAT BRITAIN PUTS INTO EFFECT IMPARTANT NEW SYSTEM UNDER WHICH MANY NATIVES CHOOSE LEGISLATORS.

DELHI, Jan. 12.—The new law for the government of India went into effect with the opening of the new year, and for the first time in the history of India under British rule, the elections for government posts are going on in accordance with the provisions of the new government of India act.

The stated aims of the new act are "to introduce more responsible government in India." The preamble of the act sums the general purposes as follows:

The Markets

MONTREAL, Jan. 12.—The receipts of eggs today were 232 cases, as against 205 for the same day last week, and 132 for the corresponding day a year ago.

—Outside of some further importations of British Columbia fresh eggs and one lot of Chinese eggs of which the quality in both cases was fairly satisfactory there has been no important feature in the local market to note, except that an easier feeling has prevailed in strictly new laid stock on account of the increased production through out the country.

—We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: New laid eggs, 90c to 95c; Fall fresh eggs, 80c to 85c; Selected C. S. eggs, 0.60 to 75c; No. 1 C. S. eggs, 0.60 to 75c; No. 2 C. S. eggs, 0.56 to 58c.

—The trade in dressed poultry this week has only been fair owing to the fact that buyers in most cases carried sufficient stock forward from the holiday season to meet their immediate requirements, consequently the demand was somewhat limited for certain lines, and as the offerings were fair an easier feeling prevailed for such and prices were reduced, while the demand for other lines was in excess of the supply and values ruled firm. The prospect, however, that a more active trade will be done in the near future, and especially so in chickens.

—We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Turkey, 52c to 53c; Good turkeys, 50c to 55c; Geese, 30c to 35c; Chickens, 30c to 35c; Ducks, 36c to 42c; Poultry, 26c to 32c.

—The trade in potatoes throughout the week has been quiet, but as the offerings have not been excessive a firm feeling has prevailed in the market and prices show no important change, and the improved demand in the near future as stocks in second hands have been reduced considerably of late.

—OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—(Dominion Live Stock Branch)—A special train of 28 cars of eggs left Vancouver January 7th for New York. A further shipment of ten cars is being made to Montreal and New York. The first train is made up of 24 cars of Chinese fresh and four cars of Washington fresh, while the latter shipment is entirely Chinese.

—CHEAGO, Jan. 8.—Eggs lower, Receipts 2,666 cases. At market cases included, 55c to 62c. NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Eggs firm. Receipts 12,500 cases. Fresh gathered extra firsts 69c; firsts 66 1/2c to 68c; State Pennsylvania and nearby western henery, whites, first to extra, 71c to 77c; do brown extra 72c to 73c; do gathered browns and mixed colors, first to extra, 67c to 71c; refrigerator firsts 61c to 62c.

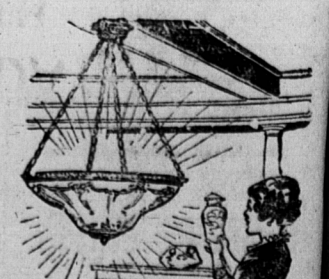
