**Stock Markets New York At A Glance Exchange**

WINNIPEG, Nov. 18 — (CP) — Rye futures advanced 1/2 cent to one cent maximum limit permitted in a day's trading on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, reversing their downward trend for the first time in several days.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18 — (AP) — Rye futures soared the five-cent limit Saturday despite new board of trade regulations restricting trading, with heavy short-covering apparently influenced by the scarcity of supplies and the high prices being paid for the cash grain.

Oats gained more than two cents a bushel at times on commission houses buying and wheat was up around a cent part of the session.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 — (AP) — The Stock Market Saturday finished its most active week in five years with profit catching stalling numerous leaders but with scattered strength sufficient to put the over-all average at a peak since early 1941.

Little change in bullish incentives although accounts were lightened here and there for protection during the week-end.

Dealers were lively from the start, and activity in the final hour helped lift volume to one of the largest for a short stretch since late 1941. Trends were mixed at the close with plus signs in the majority.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 1/2 of a point at 15.4, a ton since April 14, 1931, and on the week showed a net gain of 1/2 of a point. The utility average experienced a sharp decline Feb. 4, 1937, while the industrial and rails were unchanged.

**Premiers To Meet At Ottawa Nov. 26**

OTTAWA, Nov. 18 — (CP) — After three months' study of the Dominion Government's proposals for a revised Dominion-Provincial financial arrangement, the Premiers of the nine provinces will meet here with the Federal Government Nov. 26 to compare notes.

The Premiers and three federal ministers constitute the steering committee of the Dominion-Provincial conference which opened here Aug. 8 and adjourned a few days later.

Their function is essentially to give direction for study of the revision of the Dominion-Provincial financial relations to provincial governments. Provincial relations to the Dominion are not acceptable to British Columbia and that he is preparing counter proposals.

The Dominion proposals called for agreements whereby the provinces would leave the Dominion a clear field for the collection of personal income, corporation and estate taxes. In return the Dominion would provide the provinces with increased grants based on population and national income.

Generally speaking the grants proposed were on a scale that would give the provinces more revenue than normally they would receive on the basis of pre-war grants and collection of taxes in the three fields wanted by the Dominion.

**Other Provinces**

In addition the Dominion assumed responsibility for relief of all employable unemployed through the institution of an old age pension payable regardless of means at 70 wholly by the Dominion and a pension payable to needy persons between the ages of 66 and 69 with whom the Dominion and provinces sharing the cost.

Extensive Federal grants for national health insurance also were offered and there was a scheme for Federal assistance to provincial and municipal public works.

Since the conference adjourned provincial governments have been examining the application of the federal proposals to their own situations. There have been frequent requests to the Dominion Government's secretary for further information and clarification of different points but correspondence has not indicated the line of provincial counter-proposals.

Assuming such proposals are made it is expected they too, similar to the Dominion proposals, will be distributed to all Governments for their consideration. The steering committee may decide how that is to be done and what time should be allotted for the examination.

**Hope River Credit Union Meeting**

The annual meeting of the Hope River Credit Union Ltd., was held on the evening of October 29, and the following directors were appointed. President, Emmet McGuigan. Vice President, Oswald Murphy. Treasurer, John O'Connell. Secretary, John Field, Jas. Dolan and John Gallant.

The President welcomed the members to the annual meeting and in his annual report outlined the activities of the organization during the past year, complimenting the members on their keen interest they manifested in the past, and exhorted them to continue the good work.

The Treasurer's report which was passed unanimously by the meeting, showed an increase in share capital of sixty-five per cent. A dividend of six per cent was paid and a 2 per cent on deposits, 20 per cent of net profits was transferred to guaranty fund with 5 per cent to educational fund.

Reports were submitted by Mr. Wilfred McAleer of Supervisory Committee showing books were audited quarterly, and general audit made at end of the year. He likewise told the members of the complete way that every detail of business was carefully fulfilled by the Union.

Mr. Emmet Trainor reported for Credit Committee showing 36 loans made during the past year, with no bad loans since the organization of the Union.

The slate of officers was proposed by a nominating committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Thomas Reid. Supervisory Committee, Michael Finsat, Wilfred McAleer, Austin Bulger, Credit Committee, Alexis Murphy, Emmet Trainor and Florent Dolan.

The chief speakers of the evening were J. Leamings Murphy and Cyril Boote. The Credit Union, advised Mr. Murphy is the foundation of the cooperative movement. It is a school in which we learn the techniques and methods
