## LICENSE OR PROHIBITION?

A year ago the community was in the throes of a heated controversy in regard to the License Act passed by the Legislature at the instance of the Government. The discussion went on for months until it was made apparent to all that the temperance community of Prince Edward Island are opposed to the principle of license. The recently adopted resolutions of the Provincial and Charlottetown Temperance Alliances, made this so clear that the Patriot newspaper accepted the situation and intimated that the Government would respond with a prohibitory measure.

The hopes of the temperance people were raised by this intimation, and it was freely stated in a semi-public way that a prohibitory bill was being prepared for submission to the Legislature. So important a measure might be expected to be referred to in the Speech from the Throne at the opening, and there was a strong feeling of disappointment that no reference to prohibition was made in the Speech. Still as the Government was in a critical position few were disposed to be exacting for the moment and most of the temperance people would have been quite satisfied if at some time during the session the Government would bring forward the expected bill.

The speech of Mr. Arthur Peters in moving the Address in reply to the Speech from the throne is now taken by many as an intimation that the Government will stand by the License Law and will not bring down a prohibition bill. This conclusion may or may not be fully warranted but the mover of the Address is usually understood to be in the confidence of the Government, and hence Mr. Peters' defence of license is naturally supposed to have some significance. Are the temperance people to come to the conclusion that they have been misled by the Patriot's foreshadowing of a Government Provincial Prohibition bill?

If the Government have decided not to legislate further and will do nothing to meet the wishes of the temperance people, that decision must have an important bearing upon the coming elections. There can be no doubt that the unpopularity of the License Law among the temperance electors was a considerable factor in bringing about the reverses which the Government met with in the by-elections during the past year, and it would appear that the best hope of either party for success in an appeal to the people must rest upon satisfying the temperance electors by enacting a prohibitory measure.

There can be no evasion of this question. If not dealt with in the House it must be faced before the entire country. We await with interest the Government's decision as to a course of action, and we deem it our duty to inform them and the Opposition that neither the temperance people nor THE GUARDIAN are any better satisfied with, or any more reconciled to the License Law than they were a year ago.

A well-known citizen contrasting the various systems of dealing with the liquor traffic, and not much enamored with the Scott Act, said to THE GUARDIAN the other day: "There was one thing in favor of the Scott Act. While the old toppers did get their liquor all too freely the boys could not do so with the same facility that they could under the Regulation Act or at present." Surely this is a strong point in favor of prohibition, if it tends to save the boys. Our boys are the hope of the country. They have long lives before them and it is of vast importance that they should be kept in the right way.

## Stilling Angry Seas.

A. M. Thackara, United States Consul at Havre, reports under date of February 23, to the bureau of foreign commerce, department of state, a method of diminishing the force of waves and surf. The method is the invention of Baron Bonvenuto d'Alessandro, an Italian, residing in Paris. He thinks it will afford protection to vessels at sea, to harbor entrances and to lighthouses, and that it will be more efficient than the use of oil.

His invention consists in retaining on the surface of the water unobmergible floating net by means of outriggers when used to protect vessels in storms at sea, and by attaching it to buoys when used to protect lighthouses, hydraulic works in construction, entrances to harbors, etc.

He bases the idea of his intention upon the principle that in covering the surface of the sea with a thin, flexible, light, and floating body of whatever nature, the part covered forms a crust under which the molecules of the imprisoned mass of water cannot move in the same manner as the surrounding body of uncovered water, the result being that even the most violent waves, upon reaching the edge of the crust, instead of climbing over it, of breaking or of destroying it, will pass under it as if there were a fall or difference of level, become flattened out, and lose much of their force. The net used in the recent experiments at Havre was made of a thing hemp fibre, knitted in square meshes of four centimeters (1.57 inches) and afterward water-proofed by the application of a solution of powdered cork and pure rubber. The material of the finished net was 3 millimeters (0.12) in thickness, and light, weighing only 123 grains (4 1/2 ounces avoirdupois) per square meter, (10.76 square feet.)

The net was 110 meters (330.9 feet) long and 15 meters (49.2) wide, tened together. The two outside sections were 5 meters (16.4 feet) wide throughout the whole length of the net. The middle sections were also 5 meters (16.4 feet) wide, but extended only 16 meters (32.8 feet) from either end, leaving an open space in the centre of the net, 90 meters (295.27 feet) long and 5 meters (16.4 feet) wide. The inventor's reason for constructing the net with an open space in the centre is that in his numerous experiments with the net made in this way, when used for protection of entrances to harbors he found the surface of the water enclosed in the free spaces to be always calm, as if it were actually covered by the net. The net with the open space is only used when it is anchored. For the protection of vessels at sea, the net is made solid.

## Drinking With Meals.

Medical men have pointed out that man is probably the only animal that drinks while eating, showing how the laws of nature, which are instinctively obeyed by man's inferior, are calmly ignored by him. 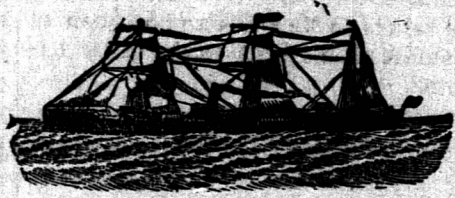
