Rookie Scores In Marathon Hockey Tilt

By Alex Bell Canadian Press Staff Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 25.—(Wednesday)—Dark-haired Modere Bruneteau, a rookie from the minors, stepped into hockey's hall of fame early this morning when he broke up the National Hockey League's longest game on record with the game-winning goal after 116 minutes and 30 seconds of overtime to give Detroit Red Wings a one-goal edge over Montreal Maroons in their three-of-five series for the League championship.

A crowd of 9,500 sat almost six hours in the Forum here to watch the tense struggle that started out with speed and heavy checking in the regular time then gradually slowed down to a walk as the players passed the old record of 194 minutes 46 seconds overtime set by Boston and Toronto in 1933.

Every period had its high spots as first one team and then the other would spurt in an effort to end the strength sapping contest with both goalkeepers rising to heights of brilliance to keep the sharp shooters scoreless through eight periods of hockey and most of the ninth.

Norm Smith had just turned back a savage Maroon four man attack when speedy Hec Kilrea streaked away fast with Bruneteau. Bruneteau flashed behind the defence and the blond Hec passed forward to the rookie. Bruneteau dodged Lorne Chabot as the goalkeeper slid out and slipped the puck into the net as a pent-up sigh that was like a groan escaped the crowd.

MONTREAL, March 25.—(Wednesday)—(C. P.)—After playing 120 minutes of hockey Montreal Maroons and Detroit Red Wings were in a scoreless deadlock at 1:30 a. m. E. S. T. in the first of their three-of-five series for the National Hockey League cup.

The teams were within 44 minutes, 46 seconds of the record for overtime in the N. H. L. in the 194 minutes and 46 seconds played by Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs in 1933 in their titular series of that year. In that year the winning goal was scored by little Ken Doraty on a pass from Andy Blair who had stepped around the great Eddie Shore.

Sargeant Again In Starring Role

(London exchange) The first of a series of challenge matches played at the Sports Stadium on Thursday resulted in a combined team of Brighton Tigers and Richmond Hawks beating a combined team of Wembley Canadians and Wembley Lions—playing under the title of "Wembley All-Stars"—by five goals to one.

The "Tiger-Hawks"—actually Duke Campbell and Earl Nicholson were the only Hawks in the team, all the rest being Tigers—were rather fortunate to win, especially by so decisive a margin. But for a wonderful display of goal-keeping by Leo Sargeant, the Wembley players would certainly have won the day.

They had most of the play, and time after time it was Sargeant alone who prevented them from scoring.

The game was quite interesting to watch, and there were some neat passing moves, but with no League points at stake there was little rough play. There were, in fact, only three suspensions, none at all in the first period, though Murphy, of the Wembley side, went off with a cut over the eye from a stick.

The Tiger-Hawks had rather the better of the first period, and goals by Klein and Duke Campbell gave them a 2-0 lead.

In the second period they were completely overplayed, but Sargeant was unshakable, preserving an impregnable defence against a machine gun-like barrage of shots, while goals scored in breakaways by Nears and Culin increased the lead to 4-0.

Klein scored a fifth goal soon after the start of the last period, and a series of hectic attacks resulted in Wilkinson obtaining Wembley's only point.

Greenberg Determined Holdout

Cleveland's Pennant Hopes Rest On Trio

NEW ORLEANS, March 24.—Manager Steve O'Neill thinks his Cleveland Indians may rise or fall on the performance of three men this season.

The question marks are Frankie Pytlak, first string catcher; Johnny Allen, right-hand pitcher obtained from New York Yankees, and George Blahodich, veteran hurler picked up from Philadelphia Athletics.

"If these fellows come through well we have a club as good as any in the American League, and with an equal chance to finish on top," O'Neill predicted today.

Generally picked as a pennant contender last season, the Indians, handicapped by injuries and illness, wound up a poor third. And this was accomplished only by a stretch drive begun after O'Neill, former pilot of Toronto's International League club, took over the managerial reins from Walter Johnson early in August. At that time the club was in fifth place.

This year O'Neill believe it will be different, if Pytlak can bear the brunt of the catching; if Allen can continue to tame the batters and if Blahodich can salvage enough of his fast ball to perform creditably in relief roles.
