PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HOSPITAL

Our Hospital has been fortunate, and undoubtedly has, in the character of the voluntary workers who sponsored it and gave so liberally of their means, time and enthusiasm for the promotion of its welfare, it has been equally fortunate in the personnel of the Medical Board and Staff by whose skill and efficiency its work of healing has been so well accomplished. It is the merest truth to say that no institution of a similar size can claim any better medical and surgical record than that which stands to the credit of the physicians and surgeons of our local Hospital. The good work begun in the days of the Hospital's infancy, now going on to nearly fifty years ago, has been consistently maintained at a high standard by those doctors who from time to time succeeded those worthy pioneers, and, in the opinion of those who are qualified to speak on the subject, those who now constitute the Medical Staff are doing equally good work, and, with the greater facilities which are contemplated, still more beneficial work will certainly be done for the benefit of our community. Some particulars of this fine succession of medical men will, no doubt, prove interesting to those who have followed the fortunes of the Hospital.

Several members of the staff achieved notable records from the point of view of length of service. Dr. James Warburton's name appears on the original staff of 1883-1884, so that, at the date of his death, he had served the hospital for forty-three years. He is referred to in the report of the Trustees for 1927 as "a most kindly gentleman, courteous always, a great practitioner, loved and missed by all." Another of the veterans is Dr. Bagnall who, appointed as surgeon-dentist at the foundation of the hospital, has to his credit an equally long term of service, and a reputation of good work well done; while his colleague on the dental staff, Dr. Robbins, gave twenty-eight years of valuable service. Another of the "old originals," Dr. F. P. Taylor, has a record of twenty-two years on the Medical Board; he was one of the small band of generous-hearted citizens to whom the Hospital owes its origin, and who never ceased to promote its welfare and to widen its sphere of usefulness. Dr. Leeming, appointed to the first staff as analyst and microscopist, rendered a similarly long term of service. One of the most devoted of the original staff was Dr. Richard Johnson, a gentleman who both adorned his profession and gave of his best to the hospital, and whose untiring devotion and enthusiasm for its welfare is engraved in the records in this sentimental but significant testimony. He lived for his fellowmen." His death in 1903 terminated twenty-one years of service. The remaining members of the first medical board are as follows:—Dr. F. D. SUDDEN DEATH AT OTTAWA—Word has been received in the city of the death of Captain J. J. R. H. Fleming who was killed in a motor accident outside of Ottawa Friday afternoon. The body was returned to Ottawa where an inquest will be held. The late Capt. Fleming who was a Rhodes scholar, was well known in this city being professor of English at Saint Dunstan's University for 4 years and during that period read law in the office of McKinnon and McNeill. He was a football player of outstanding ability, playing half back on the University team. He left this in 1929 was general manager of the community, and his loss to the Hospital deemed a great one. Dr. Edward S. Blanchard joined the staff in 1886. In 1891 Dr. Dawson who is on the present staff, and whose work and interest on behalf of the Hospital are well known. In the intervening years which bring us to the present staff we find the names of Drs. Alexander McNeill, R. B. Shaw, Gordon T. Alley, George Carruthers, D. M. McLaughlin, James Ralph, and Alexander Ross, all of these men whose diligent attention to duty, interest in the patients, and professional skill help to write down a medical and surgical record of which any hospital might well be proud. The present staff consists of the following:—Drs. H. D. Johnson, Ira J. Yeo, George F. Dewar, C. C. Archibald, J. C. Houston, R. F. Seaman, F. W. Tidmarsh, J. W. McKenzie and V. L. Goodwill. And no one needs to be told how effectively these gentlemen are maintaining the high standards set by their predecessors, and that too in the face of many difficulties not recognized by the lay public. It is when we are considering how the long and distinguished list of physicians and surgeons have played their part in the development of our Hospital that we are brought face to face with the present inadequacy of its size and equipment. There is none of the sciences making such speedy and radical progress as the science of healing. In order to practically use the new facts about the treatment of disease which are coming to light almost every day, the medical profession must have at hand every material facility for the prosecution of their work. If these facilities are absent it is at the cost of the holding up of cures and, indeed, the very endangering of life. And this is pronouncedly true of a public hospital. A public hospital which is undersized in proportion to the size of the community, and one which is lacking in the most modern and up-to-date equipment ceases at those points to be a benefit to the community, but, more than that, becomes a menace to the public welfare. The situation with which we are faced is just this, that it is impossible for our Hospital to carry on its long and admirable record of service for the people of the two counties with its present inadequate arrangements and equipment. It is no longer able to meet the increasing demands that are being made upon it whilst its condition is what it is. It would be a disaster of the greatest magnitude not only to the two counties but to the whole Province if the Hospital had to close its doors. The whole situation is a challenge of the most serious kind to our Protestant citizenship. Interest in the future of the Prince Edward Island Hospital has ceased to be merely a privilege for

the faithful few who have so nobly stood by it in the past and are still doing so. Interest in the future of the Institution is now the clear and definite duty of every Protestant man and woman on the Island. This interest, and a practical demonstration of this interest when the forthcoming appeal is made, is a claim which the Hospital has every right to demand on the score of its past services alone. We who are the sons and daughters of those beneficent and benevolent pioneers who planted this house of healing in our midst must, if we are fair in our judgments, recognize that it is "up to us" to carry on worthily the great work which they have bequeathed to us.

PRESBYTERY OF UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in Trinity Church, Summerside on Tuesday July 29th, at eleven o'clock and was constituted by prayer by the chairman, Rev. A. E. Chapman. There was a splendid representation of ministers and laymen present.

The Rev. F. H. Holmes, D. D., Fredericton, spoke in the interests of the Pine Hill Divinity Hall. The property and buildings on the North West Arm are valued at \$225,000 with an endowment of \$406,000. Before 1925 the college was in receipt of a grant of \$18,000 from the budget of the Presbyterian Church. Last year the grant from the M and M Fund was but \$12,500. A new library stack was recently erected at a cost of \$25,000 to house the 20,000 volumes. This fall a campaign for \$50,000 is to be made to meet the immediate needs of Pine Hill. Every congregation of the United Church in the Maritimes is to be given an opportunity to contribute to the support of their college.

At twelve noon Rev. Mr. MacKenzie, of Regina, conducted the devotional service. He spoke from the words: "He learned obedience by the things that He suffered," giving a vivid presentation of the living Christ.

The afternoon session opened at two o'clock. Presbytery sustained the action of its executive in appointing Rev. William MacLeod to supply Wellington pastoral charge.

Rev. W. E. Aitken, reported for the Boys' Camp which was held at Cance Cove, July 15-25. The attendance was smaller than usual this year. The work done by leaders and boys was satisfactory and beneficial to all. Mr. Aitken asked for more co-operation on the part of ministers in securing suitable boys for camp.

At three o'clock Mr. P. F. Moriarty addressed the Court in the interests of the Lord's Day Alliance. The Budget for the Maritime Provinces for the work of the Alliance is \$5,800. Congregations are asked to give a small amount averaging about \$10, per charge. This proposal was accepted by Presbytery.

An interesting feature of the afternoon's proceedings was the receiving of three candidates for the Christian ministry. Their names were John Sheen, O'Leary; Elwood MacPherson, West Cape; and Thomas Mitchell, Summerside. The name of Alfred Seaman, Pleasant Valley, was submitted by Rev. Mr. Palethorpe and received by Presbytery and placed on file.

Dr. Sain reported for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund. For the five months ending June 1st, the sum of \$4,289.57 had been forwarded to the church offices at Toronto. One half of the charges had not by that time remitted any.

On motion the meeting adjourned.
