DEFENCE SURVEY IN WEST

VANCOUVER, Sept. 18. —(CP)—A defence survey of British Columbia and Alaska coasts began today when Canadian and United States members of the International Joint Defence Board took off from Jericho air station in three United States flying boats.

American members of the commission landed their ship off the air station here early this morning, and were joined by three Canadian members who arrived from Ottawa last night. The planes took off less than an hour later. Next stop will be Sitka, Alaska.

Hunting Dont's

Here is a list of safety commandments which it is hoped will be rigidly adhered to by all Nimrods during the hunting season which opened to-day:
Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded weapon.
Always be sure that the barrel and action of a rifle or gun are clear of obstruction.

Carry only empty guns, taken down or with the action open, into your automobile, camp and home.
It is now unlawful to carry loaded firearms in an automobile or wagon in New Brunswick.

Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you should stumble and fall.

Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.
Never shoot at a moving bush.
Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.

Never climb a tree or fence with a loaded gun.
Never shoot at a flat hard surface or on the surface of water.

Never point a gun, whether loaded or empty, at another person.
Don't carry a gun or rifle on your shoulder with the muzzle pointing forward.

Don't mix gunpowder with alcohol.
Wear distinctive clothing when hunting or travelling in the woods.
