### TOOTHBRUSH WEEK BEGINS IN SCHOOLS

(New York Herald)

"Dental Hygiene Week" arranged for the purpose of making New York's 700,000 school children the hardest chewing, cleanest mouthed army of pupils in the land, began yesterday with three excellently devised lectures and a series of short preparatory instructions in all the schools of the five boroughs.

There were lectures in the afternoon in Morris High School, the Bronx, and the Brooklyn Training School, accompanied by lantern slide exhibits. In the evening Dr. Fones, of Bridgeport, Conn., leader of the dental prophylaxis campaign throughout the country, lectured and demonstrated his methods at the De Witt Clinton High School, Dr. Fones had a staff of assistants and employed full dental equipment, lantern slides and motion pictures.

All of the lecturers told of the growth of the teeth from infancy to old age and made clear every detail of their care in any condition.

Teachers from every school in the five boroughs attended some one of the lectures yesterday, and will lecture in their schools on Wednesday from notes made for the purpose. Today trained dental lecturers will go to all the schools with lantern slides and motion picture equipments, and pantomime toothbrush drills will follow the demonstrations.

Thursday is set aside for the meetings of parents associations, and Friday is the first day on which toothbrushes will be brought to school and drills will be held in preparation for Saturday.

The dental associations of the city have decided to award a trophy for the best class drills with the use of the toothbrush on this day, and exhibitions will take place at Van Cortlandt Park, Central Park, Prospect Park, Brooklyn and in Queens and Richmond. A board of judges will decide the winners, and neatly designed metal trophies will be awarded.

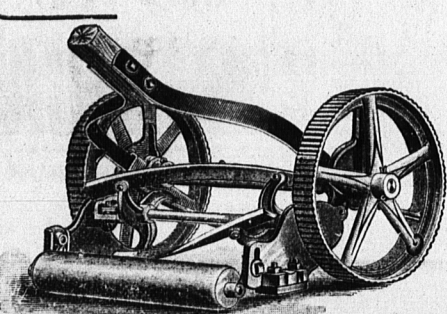
