The tide will be high this afternoon at 2.08 and tomorrow afternoon at 2.34.

The boats did not cross either way yesterday owing to north west gales, drifting snow, and the tide running the one way.

Lemon, McIntyre and Poole of Montague are entered for the championship races to be held in the Arena on Friday night.

Owing to the serious illness of a member of Knights of Columbus the social which was to be held this evening has been postponed for a week.

The damages by fire on Sunday, in the dwelling house of the late Mrs. J. D. McLeod, Queen Street, are estimated at about \$200 with no insurance.

Among the recent visitors in this City were Jas. and Mrs. Cullen, Rosenboth, and Frank Livingston and Mrs. T. Livingston of New Dominion.

Wm. G. Lee has been appointed agent for the Eastern Steamship Co. at St. John succeeding C. E. Laechler who has been transferred to Boston. There will in future be no assistant agent at St. John.

Another of Charlottetown's oldest and most respected citizens passed away yesterday about noon in the person of Benjamin Sellers, carpenter. For many years he worked at his trade in this City until compelled by ill-health to give up about two months ago. Mr. Sellers has been a regular attendant and a consistent member of the First Methodist Church for many years. He leaves to mourn a widow and two children, Fred H. of the firm of Beer & Goff and Miss Nettie Loth of this City.

The following is the remainder of the City Council report continued from yesterday's issue:—Coun. McDonald brought up the question of flooding Government Pond, where the poor citizens could enjoy a skate. The City Surveyor said this could not be done at present as the culvert under the road had broken down and the water could not be let in. At the request of the Mayor, J. D. Seaman submitted a plan by which Household Science could be taught in the City Schools which is as follows:—There are fourteen rooms in Prince Street school and by putting one or two pupils into each of the other rooms, one room could be emptied. In this room Household Science could be taught with very little more expense than would be incurred by the teacher thus dispensed with. Coun. McDonald moved that the committee be referred to the School Board. Council then adjourned.

The funeral of the late Sidney J. Allison took place yesterday afternoon from the residence of Robert Hogg, to St. Peter's Church and was largely attended. The Sons of England and "British Englishmen" attended in a body, following the mourners who were those lately associated with him in his work. Many friends were present and the church presented an impressive scene as sorrowing friends awaited the arrival of all that was mortal of one so lately among them. Rev. Canon Simpson conducted the funeral service which was fully choral, and there has seldom been seen in St. Peter's Cathedral a more affecting or touching ceremony than the one which so many gathered to witness there yesterday afternoon. The floral tributes were superb, and spoke plainly of the great esteem the deceased was held in here. Mitchell, Wreath, the staff of New Wonderland, Boquet, Geo. M. Moore, Wreath, Miss Ella Brown, (Halifax) Cross, from the S. O. E. inscribed "From sympathizing Englishmen" Wreath, Mrs. Henry Gaudet, Summerside. After the service the remains were taken to the parlors of G. D. Wright where they were embalmed, re-coffined and placed in a hermetically sealed case for transmission to England. They will leave on this afternoon's train to Georgetown, and Mrs. Hogg will accompany them to Halifax where she will see them put on board the "Sheandoah" of the Whitey Furness Line which sails on Saturday for London.
