Red Sox Club Indians; Yanks Continue Homer Streak

NEW YORK, June 24 (AP)—Boston Red Sox today pulled to within three games of first place in the American League by hammering three of the pace-setting Cleveland Indians' pitchers for 18 hits, including three homers, to win 13-7 before a crowd of 8,000 in Boston that included Babe Ruth.

Ruth was viewing his second game of the season and he still must be rated as a nemes for the Indians, for he saw their Bob Feller beaten by the Yankees about a week ago.

Here in New York, the Yankees' record home run string and Joe DiMaggio's personal hitting streak were extended another notch as the Bombers blasted out a 9-1 triumph over St. Louis Browns.

DiMaggio collected a single in the five-run eighth inning to make this the 36th straight game in which he has hit safely. The major league record is 41, set by George Sisler of the Browns in 1922.

Red Rolfe, Tom Henrich and Joe Gordon hit homers, each with one on base, to make 19 consecutive games in which the Yanks have scored on round-trip blows. The New York sluggers passed Detroit's old record of 17 games Sunday.

In Washington, the Senators climbed out of the league cellar at the expense of the White Sox as Dutch Leonard limited Chicago to eight hits in capturing a 6-3 decision.

Holman's whip Signals 14-11

Holman's softball squad took a 14-11 decision over the Signals team last night in a game played at the Park diamond. The encounter was billed as an exhibition when both squads failed to field complete teams being forced to call upon players from other teams in the league to fill the gaps.

For eight innings of the tussle it appeared as if Holman's would coast to a top-sided victory but at the first of the ninth Signals up to this time impotent both at bat and afield got their batting eyes working and before being retired had chalked up eight runs to put them within striking distance of their opponents. In fact the losers had two runners on the paths when the last hitter of the game fled out to deep centre.

Two home runs were hit during the encounter, Murray Carmichael of Holman's accounting for the first four base walkup in the third inning while Bill Warren of the Signals slammed out the other round-tripper in the first of the ninth. Warren also had a triple and double to his credit.

Cobb and Ruth Ready to play

NEWTON, Mass., June 24 (AP)—Tyrus Raymond Cobb, who plays golf with the same carefully planned recklessness he displayed during his 24 sensational baseball seasons, appeared to have an eyelash margin today over George Herman Ruth, his rival diamond immortal, when they completed their final practice rounds for tomorrow's 18-hole southpaw "grudge match" at the Commonwealth Country Club.

Before Cobb made his first trip over the newly suffered par-72 course, Ruth had completed his second practice round and had put an 80 on top of yesterday's 79.

Cobb, wild on the tees going out, reached the turn in 41 but came back in 37 for a 78.

Cards Show Form In Beating Boston Braves 13-

NEW YORK, June 24 (AP)—The Cardinals were hotter than the St. Louis weather today—90 degrees and a boiling sun—as they smoothed Boston's Braves 13-1 and clung to their slim National League lead.

Lon Warneke limited the Braves to four hits. Every Cardinal hit safely at least once.

Hank Leiber, the Cubs slugger, was banned in Chicago as the Cubs dropped a 3-1 decision to New York Giants.

The star outfielder was knocked down by one of Cliff Melton's pitches in the eighth inning but was revived quickly by the application of wet towels as he lay beside home plate.

The Giants also had an accident today, home run king Mel Ott being forced to retire in the second inning because of a bruised finger which he hurt fielding a single by Babe Dahlgren.

Two ninth-inning errors robbed Bucky Walters of a shutout in Cincinnati as, with five-hit hurling, he pitched and batted the Reds to a 5-1 victory over their "Jinx" opponents, Philadelphia.

Walters scored the Reds' two final runs in the eighth by doubling.

Angott decisions Harry Hurst

TORONTO, June 24 (CP)—Sammy Angott, National Boxing Association lightweight champion, outpointed Harry Hurst of Montreal over 10 rounds in a non-title bout here tonight. Angott, of Louisville, Ky., weighed 137 and Hurst 137 1/2.

In the semi-final, Eddie Petrin of Montreal retained his Canadian bantamweight title by scoring a unanimous 10-round decision over Neil Broadhead of Hamilton and Guelpf They both weighed 118.

Slight shortage Of ball covers

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 24 (CP)—Those horsehide jackets covering baseballs are becoming mighty scarce since the Nazi armies swept through the Balkans.

John H. Grady, a baseball-producing concern, said the main source of horsehides had been the Balkans, Belgium and France, now all in German hands.

"Now that the Nazis have overrun the Balkan countries, we've just got to look for new fields," Grady declared.

How about North America? Not a chance, says Grady.

"In Europe," he explained, "horsemeat was used for human consumption. The horses were killed younger. The hides, in good condition, were taken off in expert manner and tanning was an established industry. In America Old Dobbin is used principally as a work horse. When his useful days are over he is turned out to pasture or shipped off to the soap factory."

Golf Bridesmaid Finally a 'Bride'

WASHINGTON, June 24 (CP)—For years Craig Wood had been ranked as one of the world's great golfers... but until a few days ago he had never been able to win a major championship. He had been tabbed as golf's runner-up guy, always second best. "Always the bridesmaid and never the bride," somebody said.

Wood's first big disappointment came eight years ago; away back in 1933 he tied with Denny Shuts for the British Open. He lost the playoff.

The next year Craig Wood was defeated by Paul Runyan after the scheduled 36-hole P.G.A. championship final but Paul won their extra hole duel.

Everyone thought Wood had won the 1935 Augusta Masters; but Gene Sarazen's marvellous double-eagle spoon shot enabled him to tie. He beat Craig in the playoff.

Two years ago Wood, Byron Nelson and Shute tied in the U.S. Open. Craig and Nelson still were tied after the first playoff and Nelson won the second round.

But Wood finally found success in Texas the other day. He won the coveted U. S. Open. First to congratulate him was Shute, who finished second. So the old phrase, "Always a bridesmaid, but never a bride" cannot apply to Craig any longer.

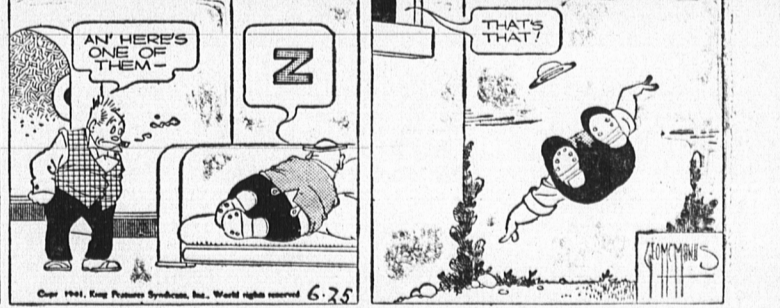
