THE MARKETS

There was a small attendance at the market yesterday, and the quantity of produce for sale was very limited.

Poultry brought about the usual prices. Geese sold from 10c to 12c per lb, turkeys 14c to 15c and chickens 7c to 8c.

Eggs and butter keep about the same price selling at 25c and 22c respectively.

Hay sold from 70c to 80c per cwt and \$14.00 per ton pressed. Oats brought from 40c to 45c per bushel and potatoes 20c per bushel.

The price of pork remains the same from 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb.
