NEW YORK, N. Y., May 27—Reactionary tendencies continued Saturday, but the declines were not large and activity was reduced.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 27—Gold bars quoted in London at 1415 vs 1425 on Saturday.

The French Cabinet agreed today to ask full power from Parliament to deal with the most serious financial situation since the late Raymond Poincaré saved the franc in 1926.

Wholesale and retail movement continued unsatisfactory in United States during past week.

Refreshing rains, rapidly growing pastures, meadows and small grain crops, higher prices and larger current farm income have wrought a profound change in the U. S. farm situation.

Humble Oil and Rig Co with large producing facilities was among the companies most favored by the increased crude oil prices last year.

Reports of railroad earnings for the month of April at hand thus far have included some happy surprises for the holders of these securities. That month was the first in which the carriers paid the full wage rate in effect prior to the 10 per cent reduction in 1932, but they had been benefited for a part of the month of higher freight charges, authorized by the interstate commerce commission.

President Roosevelt's message of transportation will likely be sent to Congress this week.

Banon. Cal receipts were 818 head. The calf market was active and prices higher. A few small lots brought \$5.50 to \$6.50. Medium good to good calves brought around \$5.75 to \$6.75 for medium kinds and around \$5 for plain light kinds. Prices were not established on bulls.

Sheep receipts were 216 head. Good spring lambs, averaging 50 lbs. or better, brought \$12 per hundredweight. Mixed lots of fair weights brought \$10. Sheep were from \$2.50 to \$4.25 with the bulk between \$3.50 and \$4.

Ewes \$2.50 to 4.25; lambs, good, \$12; common \$10. Hog receipts were 1,002 head. Hogs were moving slowly at higher prices. About 60 per cent of the hogs were sold at \$9.75 for hams, fed and watered, with one lot of 100 hogs at \$10 for hams. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium. Butchers' hams and lights were cut 50 cents per hundredweight and extra heavies were cut \$1 per hundredweight. Sows were slow at \$6.50 to \$7.25—tops \$7.50.

NEW YORK, May 27—Offerings on the two Montreal livestock markets today totalled 2,632 head. Cattle receipts were 796 head. Early sales were confined to cows and common to medium quality butcher cattle sold mostly in small lots to the wholesale butchers. Prices were generally estimated to be 25 cents higher on these grades. One load of female stock was weighed for shipment to Newfoundland. Good cows ranged from \$4.50 to \$5 with medium butcher cows mostly \$3.50 to \$4 and plain kinds from \$2.50 to 3.25. Canners and outters ranged from \$1.75 to \$2.25. Heifers sold from \$3.75 to \$4.50.

NEW YORK, May 27—The accompanying chart shows how the price of gasoline to the retailer has decreased and the gasoline tax has increased since 1924. The data for this graph are based on figures published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.



EVER since 1920 the price of gasoline has steadily declined. Few people realize this however because during the past ten years as the price dropped the tax increased. In 1923 there was no provincial gasoline tax and the average price of gasoline to retail dealers across Canada was 27 1/2 cents per gallon. Today the average price of gasoline to retailers is 18 1/2 cents but to this is added a tax of from six to eight cents per gallon which goes directly to the provincial governments.

Not only has the price of gasoline fallen steadily since 1920 but the quality has consistently improved. The gasoline consumer today gets more value than ever before.

Sometimes you hear talk of large profits earned by the gasoline refiner. In 1934 Imperial Oil earned \$3,023,400.12. 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PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, May 27—Montreal produce markets today continued last week's firm trend, eggs and new potatoes. The butter market was generally 21 cents a pound for carlots or less of no 1 grade. Small lots at the retail trade were quoted by jobbers at 22 cents for solids and 23 cents for prints.

Graded shipments in carlots or less for eggs were quoted at 19-1-2 cents a dozen for A large, 17-1-2 cents for A medium, 17 cents for B and 16-1-2 cents for C. The cheese market was firmer at 10 cents for no 1 Ontario, current arrivals.

The potato market was steady to a little higher, new South Carolina stock no 1 being \$5.50 to \$5.75 per barrel and no 2 South Carolina stock was \$2.25 to \$2.50 for 100-pound bags. No 1 Bermudas went for \$1.75 to \$2.00 per 50 pound crate. Old potatoes were 35 to 40 cents per 80-pound bag of Quebecs, 42-1-2 cents for New Brunswick and 45 cents for Prince Edward Islands.

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MINING

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, May 27—The mining section of the Toronto exchange slipped into reverse today for no apparent reason though the month-end settlement may have encouraged pools to apply a little pressure in the hope of squeezing out some selling by under-margin- ed traders. The gold group was the weakest while Base metals and silvers were only moderately heavy. Volume declined as prices weakened which was a favorable sign from the viewpoint of the bulls. Fewer than half a million shares turned over.

Lake Shore was offered down to 51.25 and the close at \$52 was off 85 cents. McIntyre, on small volume lost 1.10. Hollinger dropped 15 cents, Teck Hughes 1 and Bralorne and Little Long Lac 10 each. Pioneer and Wright Hargreaves improved slightly.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, May 27—The French franc dipped a major fraction in the foreign exchange markets today as the French monetary crisis continued. The closing rate was 6 5/8 3/8 cents, off 005-8 of a cent. Sterling ruled irregular, and after advancing to \$4.95 1-2 weakened to a closing rate of \$4.93 5/8 for a net loss of 7-8 of a cent. The Canadian dollar was quoted at a premium of 1-32 per cent, against 1-8 premium Saturday.
