**Toxoid Prevents Diphtheria Is Your Child Protected?**

Diphtheria is a communicable disease. It is also preventable yet each year young lives are needlessly sacrificed due either to ignorance or negligence on the part of parents or guardians of children. However, the gospel of Public Health is spreading as can be observed from the following figures:

From these figures it can be seen that the number of cases, taking Canada as a whole, are decreasing very materially. This is also shown in Ontario and in Prince Edward Island. All the other provinces show a corresponding decrease both in the number of diphtheria cases and deaths. This decrease in cases and deaths is due to one cause and one cause only—namely Toxoid protection.

During the four year period (1929-32) Canada had an average death rate of 554 and Prince Edward Island of 3. Contrast this with the four year period (1921-24) and we find Canada had an average death rate of 1633 and Prince Edward Island with an average death rate of 10. The only factor that could possibly change these rates was the immunizing campaign waged during the later period against diphtheria by protecting the school and pre-school children by toxoid.

Similar results could be shown in every province and in every state that has been active in protecting its children. Surely these results are worth while and although we can report progress yet the campaign must ever go forward. It is not necessary that we should have any cases or any deaths and it is towards that objective that the Department of Health are striving.

**May Relinquish Chairmanship Of Committee**

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Oct. 27—(Saturday)—Before the end of the present week it is expected that Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce, will have quit his post as chairman of the Royal Commission investigating mail buying and price spreads, and possibly his portfolio in the Bennett Cabinet. The Montreal Gazette says today in a despatch from its Ottawa correspondent.

The despatch declares that Thursday's cabinet meeting was chiefly occupied with a discussion of the situation created by Mr. Stevens' publication of a pamphlet dealing with the probe and "understands he was given time in which to determine what course he would take."

The despatch proceeds: "There was a meeting of the cabinet today (Friday) to resume discussion of the matter, but it is learned that Mr. Stevens was not in attendance. Another meeting has been called for tomorrow and as the mail buying probe is to resume next Monday, a final decision on its continuance tomorrow night, while Mr. Stevens was not accessible for a statement today it is believed that by tomorrow night his resignation as chairman of the Royal Commission will have been received by the Prime Minister and his colleagues."

**POPULAR COACH ENTERS QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY**  
 KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 27—(CP)—Theodore H. Coffey, former Rugby and hockey coach of the University of New Brunswick, arrived here today from Fredericton, N.B. to enter Queen's Medical College.

**Sadler to Marry School Mistress**

(Canadian Press) OXFORD, England, Oct. 28—Educationists will hear with interest that Sir Michael Sadler, who is retiring from the Mastership of University College, Oxford, is to marry Miss Eva Gilpin, Headmistress of the Hall School, Weybridge. Sir Michael is 73 and his bride-elect is some 10 years younger. Miss Gilpin, who founded the school in 1891, is also a director of the Summer School for British, French and German children. She was a great friend of Sir Michael's first wife, who died in 1932. Sir Michael and Lady Sadler intend living at the Zookery, a fine old house near Oxford.

**Banker Forced To Borrow Quarter**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27—(CP)—A banker borrowed a quarter from a reporter today and was accused by President Roosevelt of begging from the White House steps. Francis M. Law, retiring president of the American Bankers Association, found himself minus the change to pay a taxicab bill when he arrived at the White House for a call on the President. He borrowed the quarter from a White House correspondent. When the story reached Mr. Roosevelt, he smilingly accused Law of begging from the White House steps. To restore Law's credit, Robert V. Fleming, vice-president of the Bankers Association, loaned him a quarter in the presence of the President and this was returned to the reporter.

**Whitewash Mixtures**

The various ways of making white-wash either for the adorning of the home or as a disinfectant of certain farm buildings are of perennial interest.

The mixture used at the Dominion Experimental Station, Scott's Bay, for the inside of buildings used by poultry, sheep, hogs and cattle has several materials added to the lime and water. First, fifty pounds of lime is dissolved in eight gallons of hot water. To this is added six gallons of hot water which has ten pounds of salt and one pound of alum dissolved in it. A can of lye is added to every twenty-five gallons of the mixture. A pound of cement to every three gallons is gradually added and thoroughly stirred.

The object of using alum is to prevent the lime rubbing off. Cement makes a more creamy mixture so that it is easier to apply and more surface covered. Lye is added for disinfecting purposes, but a quart of cresol disinfectant to every eight gallons would serve the same purpose. Lye is preferred when the colour is to be kept white.

Frequently inquiries are made for a waterproof whitewash to be used outside. This can be made as follows: Slake 63 pounds of quicklime in 12 gallons of hot water and add two pounds of salt and one pound of sulphate of zinc dissolved in two gallons of water. To this mixture add two gallons of skim milk. An ounce of alum per gallon, though not essential, would improve it. Salt should be omitted if required for metal surfaces which rust.

**HEAVY SUGAR CANE CROP**

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Oct. 26—Indications are that the largest crop of sugar cane in years will be reaped in this island during the coming harvest. Erection of the United Fruit Company's gin mill is being pushed to cope with the large increase in raw material.

**Questions Poet's Nationality**

ROME, Oct. 27—(CP)—Italy avroks today to find her national poet, Dante Alighieri, stolen by the Germans!  
 The news was revealed in an article in the Giornale D'Italia. It described the attempted proof by the German professor, Eduard that Dante was of German origin, since the name Alighieri was nothing but the Italianisation of the German Alieghen, as meaning "everybody likes him."  
 The Giornale D'Italia declared it was now the turn of a bold Italian Savant to prove that Goethe was Italian since the name Goethe could be regarded as the Germanisation of the Italian word Gota, meaning "drop."

**Newspapers For The Saturday Night Bath**

Newspapers have a variety of uses besides furnishing news and helping the manufacturer dispose of his products through advertising. In many countries they are used extensively for wrapping parcels while in Mexico they furnish fuel for the Saturday night bath. Water is heated in cylindrical wood burning water heaters which have a small storage capacity and fuel ranges from old newspapers to wood kindlings, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Cooking is done generally over charcoal burners which is practically the only cooking stove used by the poorer classes, while practically all of the homes of the higher income classes are equipped with grates for charcoal fires. There is no use of coal for domestic purposes and wood is only employed in open fireplaces.

**Lamb Feeding Requirements**

The industry of fattening Western range lambs and domestic feeder lambs in Eastern Canada is prospering, and, as has already been proved, careful attention to feeding at all stages has resulted in increased profits to producers. In giving suggestions as to how to start feeding the lambs after arrival at the feeding quarters, the Dominion Department of Agriculture—under whose direction the project was evolved—points out that before ordering lambs care should be taken to make sure that ample accommodation is provided. Lambs require approximately one foot of feeding space per lamb, and 16 to 20 square feet of pen room. One hundred lambs is a handy unit for individual farmers owning 100 acres of land and requiring extra stock to use surplus hay and grain. On many farms there is ample shed room which can be equipped with feeding racks and grain troughs to make ideal housing quarters. Care should be taken to make sure that facilities are provided for a regular and clean supply of water. Failure to have quarters ready when lambs arrive invariably results in lack of attention at the most critical time. Lambs that are distributed while repairs are being made do not start to feed so well.  
 And water heaters and, therefore, coal and wood stoves are unknown except in the area near the American border. Oil stoves are coming into greater use in recent years, the Mexican Government endeavoring to change the cooking and heating methods of the people in order to conserve the forests which have suffered serious depletion as a result of the tremendous consumption of charcoal. Electrical stoves, ovens and other heating appliances are used only by the more wealthy classes.

**Protest Radio Of Houde Talk**

MONTREAL, Oct. 28—(CP)—Strong disapproval of the use of a nationally-owned radio system "to oppose the rights of half the people to whom the Canadian radio system belongs" was expressed in a resolution adopted by the executive of the Canadian Alliance for Women's Vote in Quebec.  
 The resolution protested against part of a speech recently delivered by Mayor Camille Houde in which he advocated curtailment of women's work. The speech was broadcast from a local station over a nationwide hook-up by the Canadian Broadcasting Commission.
