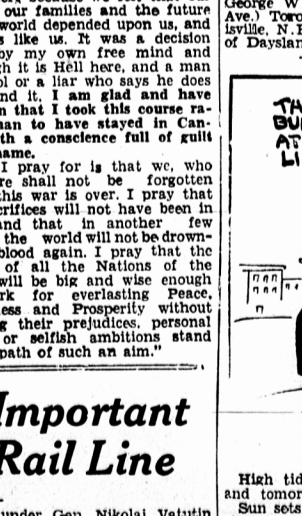
LIEUT. GORDON R. DEBLOIS

Land Assault Fails; Chased From Air Also

Enemy Planes Fail To Halt Landing of Supplies For Allied Forces.

ALGIERS, Jan. 28—(AP)—Allied land and air forces have dealt the Nazis a twin defeat in the battle for Rome, turning back an enemy assault on the Anglo-American bridgehead at a post 21 miles from the Italian capital and destroying 28 German planes in furious sky fights over the landing beachhead, the Allied command announced today.
