

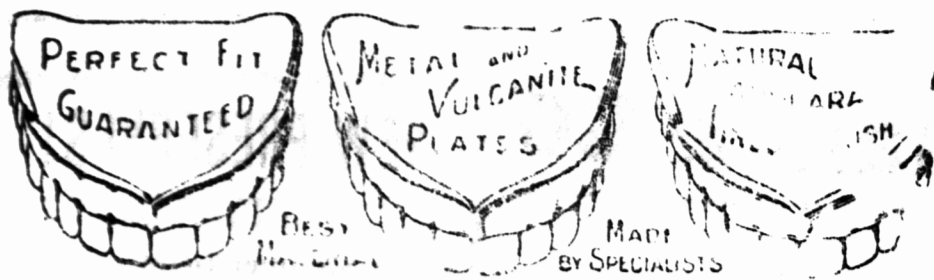

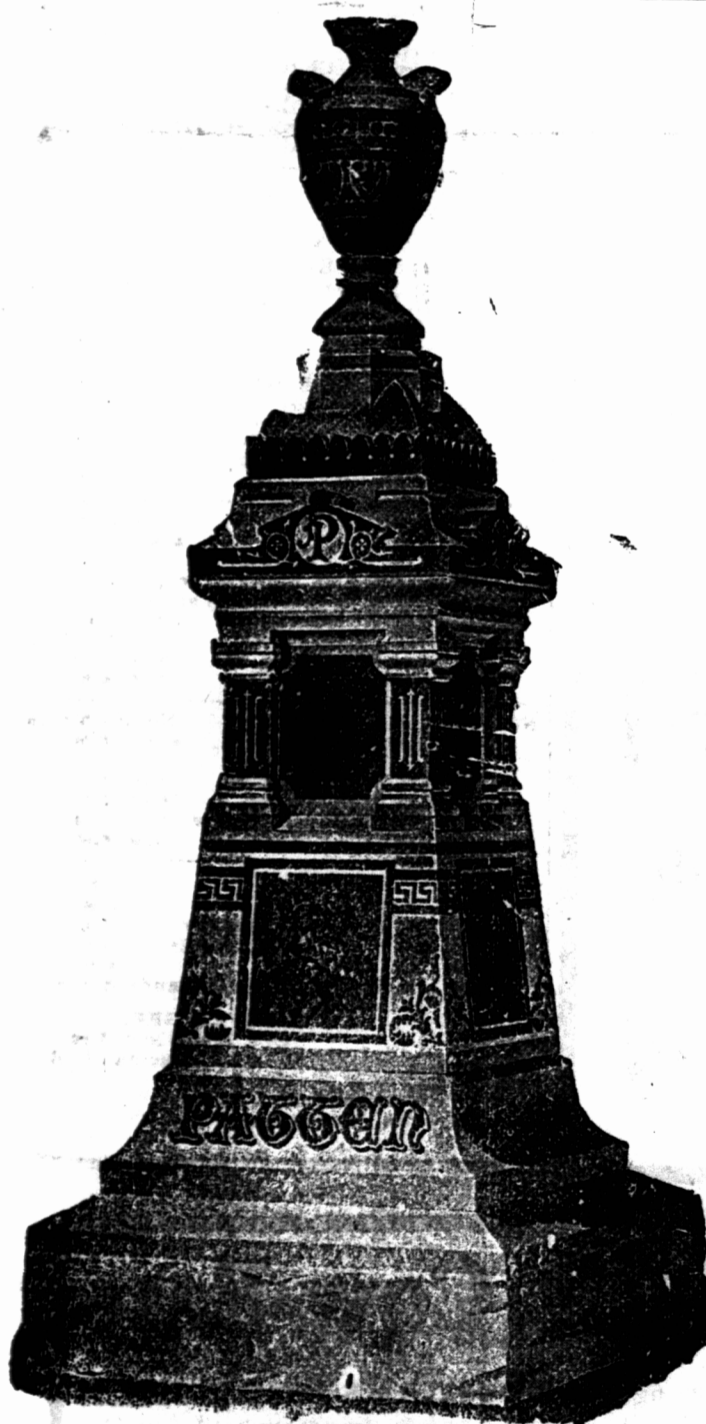

OLD STRAWBERRY BEDS.

Detailed Instructions for Their Renovation—How to Conserve Moisture.

As soon as the fruiting season is over, run the mowing machine over the ground, cutting the vines and other growths as close to the earth as possible. Allow the cut litter to remain on the ground until quite dry, or if the block is so situated as to be safe from fire, the litter may be burnt on the ground. If this is not practicable, rake up clean and haul off, then at once plow between the rows with an 8-inch turning plow, turning the furrows together, leaving the rows of plants 6 to 8 inches standing.

Leave in this condition until the growth covered is dead. In a week or ten days rake the rows of plants with an iron-toothed rake, taking out all the trash and surplus plants. The plants should not stand closer than 4 to 6 inches. As soon as this is done level the ridges with a small toothed cultivator or one-horse harrow. This should be thoroughly done, working up all space fine and mellow, with the dirt worked to the rows of plants. Follow with the small-toothed cultivator at intervals of six or eight days, until the middle or last of September, when runners may be placed in proper position to make plants. Setting plants, however, from fruiting stock is not advisable if the best results are expected.

If fertilizing is required, top-dressing with well-rotted compost may be advisable after the plant rows are raked. Cultivate the compost into the soil. There is a possible chance of making the soil too rich with humus. Soil that will produce good corn is rich enough to grow good strawberries. If color and flavor are lacking in strawberries, phosphoric acid and potash should be applied. If plant growth is lacking, add nitrogen.

After the ground is frozen and winter has come to stay, cover the entire surface of the block with any coarse litter, free from seed, just thick enough to shade the plants. In the spring as soon as the crowns of the plants show new white growth rake the covering off the plant rows, leaving it in the middle of the space to protect the outside berries from being sandied by rain. Scale Remedy Succeeds.

The work carried on by the Ontario Department of Agricultural, in connection with the San Jose scale appears to be attracting the attention of the United States department. A request has just been received to have the inspector, Mr. George E. Fisher, attend the meeting of the American entomologists at Pittsburg on June 28th to 30th. In this connection it might be stated that two photographs have just been received at the department which will illustrate how successfully the scale may be met under proper treatment. In August of last year, Mr. Fisher selected two trees at Burlington, one having but a few scales and the other completely covered, some limbs dead and others incrustated. The badly infested tree was sprayed with dilute crude oil, the other tree was allowed to stand. The photographs just taken show that the treated tree has renewed its vigor, is well covered with leaves and is bearing fruit. The untreated tree shows about two thirds of its top already killed.—Toronto Globe.

This Is Intensive Farming.

France, with an area less than the state of Texas, produces 335,000,000 bushels of wheat against 600,000,000 bushels for the whole United States. The Government of France takes a great interest in agriculture, besides there are several great national agricultural societies to which large appropriations are made by the Government. Each farmer is permitted to bring samples of his soil from each square rod of his ground to have it analyzed, and a chart is given him showing what particular crop any part of his ground is capable of producing in the greatest abundance. With the chart he also can have instructions about what fertilizers he must apply in order to produce 40 bushels of wheat to the acre, and similar information for other crops. The Government also gives prizes and medals for best yields and places the names of successful competitors on a roll of honor. Is it any wonder that the French farmers farm intensively?

Food for Growing Chicks.

Free range chickens get along very well on a feed morning and evening of grain of any kind ordinarily grown on the farm. Corn should be broken or cracked coarsely, and not ground too fine. It is quite a loss of feed to feed dry meal if ground fine, and it is not best to feed it wet. Grains of corn broken in two is my preference, and I like to feed it to the growing chicks just as soon as they are able to swallow it thus if it is given them. Wheat is excellent and hulled oats I consider the best, but it is not often we can get them thus. It is rather difficult to grow chicks in confinement and have them mature as early, or develop into as good birds as those on free range. Milk is the best food for chicks confined; that is, milk with other food. Sweet milk should be before them about all the time. Skim milk will answer very well. Milk is certainly to be desired in all cases for growing chicks.

The Brain Clogged by Fungus.

The three inch tile drain to a vinegar cellar became completely clogged by an unusually luxuriant growth of the fungus Leptomitium lacteus. The obstruction was readily removed by placing a handful of copper sulphate crystals in the upper end of the drain.

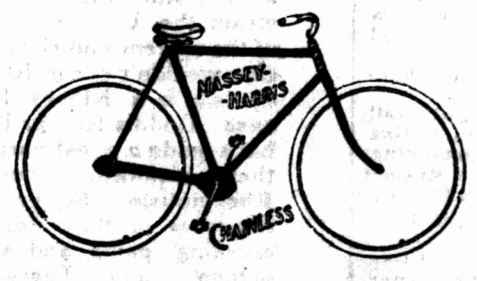
