## PREFERENTIAL TRADE

In the last fiscal year for which we have full accounts, ended 30th June 1899, the following values of dutiable cotton, iron and steel and woollen goods were imported and entered for home consumption in Canada:

Manufactures of Cotton	\$5,957,116.
Do Iron and steel	15,621,346.
Do Wool	9,803,197.

Here we have over thirty one million dollars worth of goods—the selling price to consumers would be probably nearly fifty millions of dollars, for the duties, and importers' profits must be added before the goods reach their final purchasers. These goods are all materially affected in price by the preferential tariff. Last year, as is well known, the preference given to British goods was 25 per cent. and this preference is shortly to be increased to 33 and one third per cent. of the ordinary duties. That is, one quarter of the amount of the regular tariff duties was taken off these goods when imported from Britain last year and in the future one third of the duties will be taken off.

It is not by any means claimed that all, or even half the cotton, woolen and iron and steel manufactures came in directly under the preferential tariff. As a matter of fact about one quarter of the cottons, more than four fifths of the iron and steel goods and something less than a quarter of the woolen manufactures came in under the general tariff and paid the full tariff rates. But it is to be observed that in all these and many other lines of goods to which the preferential tariff applies the consumer was benefited because of the preference. American manufacturers, in order to enable them to pay the higher tariff rates than British manufacturers had to pay and still compete in the Canadian market, were forced to reduce their prices.

Nor did the advantage to consumers stop here. Not only were the prices of foreign goods reduced in this way, but the same rule applied with equal force to cotton, woolen, iron and steel goods produced in Canada—of what value we cannot say, but it runs into tens of millions of dollars. It is therefore quite obvious that the gain to Canadian consumers from reduced prices owing directly to the preferential tariff must be very great.

During the past year and the elapsed months of the current year there has been a large general advance in the price of goods in all the great markets of the world. This general advance in prices may have caused some unthinking persons to believe that the gain to consumers from the preferential tariff has been less than it has really been. Such persons might be led to say that the prices of many articles they are obliged to purchase are not lower than they were before the preferential tariff came into force, but higher. And this might be true, and yet it must readily appear that the higher the price of dutiable goods in the markets of the world the greater is the advantage which consumers derive from the preferential tariff. This must necessarily be true so long as the customs duties are imposed in proportion to the price of the goods—ad valorem duties as we call them.

St John city council has adopted a series of resolutions asking the Government in effect to restrict the preferential clauses of the customs tariff to goods arriving direct at Canadian ports. Copies of these resolutions have been forwarded to other Canadian seaport cities and towns inviting their concurrence. The proposal is one well deserving of consideration and one in which our own city might properly take an interest. Legislation would be required to give effect to the proposal.

His Worship, Mayor Warburton has authorised a subscription list to be opened at the City Clerk's office for the sufferers by the Ottawa and Hull fire. The object is a worthy one.

The esteemed Patriot is slightly in error in stating that "the annual income or revenue of the (British) Government is only \$200,000,000." The British national income last year was £108,336,193, or over \$527,000,000.

Mr. A. E. Ings has shown THE GUARDIAN a copy of the Transvaal Argus published at Pretoria on 5th November, 1879. The paper is in a good state of preservation and is of interest because the Transvaal was at that time under British rule, and the troubles which led to the revolt were then beginning to show themselves. Already the Boers were refusing to pay taxes and were clamoring for "independence," making forcible seizures of arms and ammunition, etc. The Argus, while strongly supporting British rule, blamed the Government for having failed to carry out some promises made when Sir Theophilus Shepstone took possession of Pretoria, but did not at that time apparently apprehend the general revolt which was soon to occur.

## The Colored Cycle Cyclone.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 1.—Major Taylor the colored cycle cyclone, will be reinstated upon the payment of a fine of \$500 to the American Cycle Union, the organization being allied with the National Cycling Association. The action has not been definitely decided, but the meeting probably

will be called at once to settle the status of the colored man once and for all time.

Taylor is at present suspended for life by the Union, and the National Association recognizes the suspension and will not give the colored man his registration. The delay in action upon his application for a reconsideration of his suspension filed last winter, has been brought about by the decided position taken by the Western men, Stevens and Freeman, McFarland and Downing, while not members of the committee, exercise some influence among the men. It seems certain that the Eastern men, Cooper, Kiser, Maya, Spooner, Fisher and Eaton, will vote together in favor of a fine of \$500, \$400 of which is assessed for the union men at Cape Girardeau brought about by the desertion of Taylor on the morning of the meet, and \$100, a nominal sum only, the straight fine.

Taylor is content with a fine of these proportions. He is at present at Indianapolis, where he awaits the action of the committee before starting in training. All the racing men agree that Taylor should be barred out, but the Eastern men have come to believe it for the best interest of the game that he should be reinstated. Track associations, clubs, and promoters everywhere feel that Taylor is an attraction and want him reinstated.
