By James W. Barton, M. D. (Continued from Page 2) they have cancer of the breast, when the "lump" is simply a harmless milk gland. A "real" heart attack - pain under the breast bone going over in the left shoulder and arm - is caused by closure of a blood vessel supplying the heart muscle with blood. The closure may be caused by a clot of blood lodging in the vessel, or to closure or tightening of the blood vessel due to emotional disturbances. Naturally, closure caused by spasm due to emotional disturbances is not as serious as where a blood vessel is broken or where the blood vessel has been hardened, because the elastic tissue in the blood vessel has been replaced with fibrous tissue. The treatment of any heart attack, until the physician arrives, is to loosen the clothing and allow the patient to assume any position in which he feels comfortable.

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Islanders I Have Met

WINNIPEG, Dec. 30 (Special) - This afternoon I spent a few hours in pleasant conversation with Dr. and Mrs. Eustace Purdie, at the Kilmarnock Apts., Balmoral Street, Winnipeg. Dr. Purdie is a son of the late James T. Purdie and Jane Bowley Douse Purdie, and was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I. Dr. Purdie's paternal grandfather was born in Edinburgh, Scotland and came to Charlottetown where he carried on a store and a private bank at the corner of Pownall and Water Streets. The paternal grandfather is considered to be the first man on P. E. I. who paid cash for produce. This was the day of the barter system. For forty years, Dr. Purdie's grandfather was an elder in St. James Church, Charlottetown, and for thirty eight years he was the Superintendent of the Sunday School. Dr. Purdie's maternal grandfather William Douse was of English stock and for twenty-eight consecutive years was a Conservative member of the Legislative Assembly, Charlottetown for the Belfast District. Dr. Purdie graduated from the Toronto University and Wycliffe College and was ordained to full orders in the Church of England by Bishop Day Reeve on behalf of the Archbishop of Rupert's Land. In the summers during his college course, he did mission work on P. E. I. and in Oxbron and Brookdale, Manitoba. "After graduation he became minister in St. Luke's Church, St. John, N. B. Later he accepted the Rectoryship of Christ Church, Campbellton, N.B., and while there he was largely responsible for building three churches - one in the town and two in rural districts, the latter two being ministered to by assistants. From there he was called to St. James Church, Saskatoon, and later to the Church of the Atonement, Philadelphia, Pa.

Dr. Purdie is, at present, principal of the Western Bible College, which is in connection with the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, and which was organized by Dr. Purdie, with the assistance of

a few others in 1925. The Western Bible College gives a full theological course, and has eleven members on the faculty. Since 1925, over four hundred have passed through the college, of which forty-two are missionaries in seven different countries, and thirty-four are on the staffs of different Bible and academic colleges and schools. Dr. Purdie is honorary assistant at St. Margaret's Evangelical Church of England. Dr. Purdie is married to Frances Emma Morrison of Brantford, Ont., a graduate of the Church of England, Deaconess House. They were born two children, Helen and J. Arnold. Helen is married to Rev. Dr. Earl Edwin Cairns, Presbyterian Minister, a Professor at Wheaton College, Ill., U.S. J. Arnold who holds three degrees is a clergyman of the diocese of New York, and is assistant secretary of a national committee of the Protestant Episcopal Church of U.S. Mrs. (Dr.) Purdie, teaches at the Western Bible College, and gives lectures in Modern Culture, Public Reading, and Voice Culture. Dr. Purdie gives lectures in Systematic Theology, which includes The Idea of Theology, The Structure of Theology, The History of Doctrine and New Testament Theology.

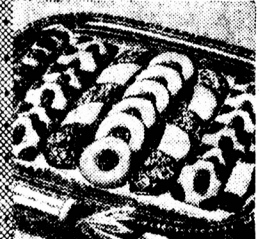
WINSLOE NORTH W. M. S.

Canada Regarded As "Strong Ally"

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 - (CP) - Canada was described to a Senate committee today as "a strong ally" in assisting the United States to carry out its European recovery plan. C. Tyler Wood, spokesman for the State Department, and others defended the system under which Canada is voluntarily reducing fuel oil imports from the United States. They were questioned by a Senate small business sub-committee on reasons why recent export controls on fuel oil had not applied to Canada. Woods said the same objective had been achieved by voluntary action in Canada after consultation, and he added that was the way the administration wanted to deal with Canada. "There is no country in the world that we can look to for assistance in the European recovery plan as we can look to Canada," Wood said. "Canada has been a great pillar of strength in the aid-to-Europe effort. It is important to us that we have such an ally. It is important to us that we assist in keeping their economy up to the point where they can give us that assistance. I think Canada will continue to be our strong ally." The sub-committee, headed by Senator Kenneth Wherry (Rep.-Neb.), is working on the acute fuel oil shortage. The committee was also interested in steel exports to Canada. Bruce said this was being discussed, that the increase was not a volume calling for any reduction and that he was sure that problem could also be dealt with by voluntary co-operative action. He said that in respect of fuel oil, Canada's requirements up to recently had been dealt with on the same level as United States requirements. "Canada was looked upon in that respect as a 49th state," Bruce said.



MAGIC'S RICH Chocolate Dips!

6 Cream 1/2 c. shortening and 1/2 c. sugar. Add 1 egg, beat. Add 2 lbs. grated orange rind and 2 cups orange juice. Sift together 1 1/2 c. sifted all purpose flour, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. soda. Mix. Chill. Roll dough thin, cut according to directions below. Bake in 375°F. oven, 10 min.

Essent Cookies Follow above recipe, cut with crescent cutter. Bake. Spread with melted sweet chocolate, sprinkle with finely chopped walnut meats.

Filled Cookies Follow above recipe, cut with round cutter. Cut smaller round from center of 1/2 the rounds. Bake. Then spread plain round with melted sweet chocolate; top with doughnut rings.

Cocoa Butter Follow above recipe, cut in strips. Add 1/2 c. cocoa butter, 1/2 c. milk, 1/2 c. sugar. Bake. Dip ends in melted sweet chocolate.

Peanut Squares Follow above recipe, cut dough into squares. Dip ends in melted sweet chocolate.

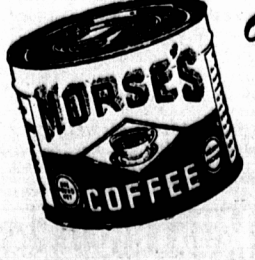
