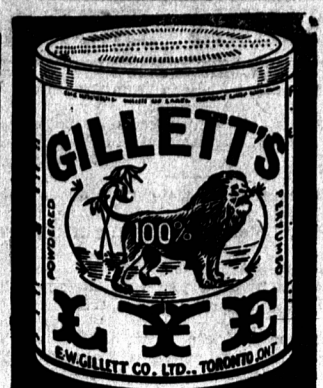

PRONOUNCED LINES IN THE TAILORED SUITS.

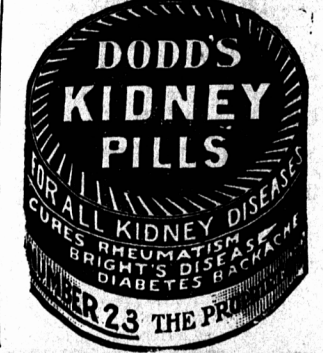
LEATHER GOODS.
